ORITA SAID THAT DEPUTY FOREIGN MINISTER FIRYUBIN MAD CALLED IN THE JAPANESE AMBASSADOR ON SEPTEMBER 7 AND 9 TO DELIVER VERY HARSH MESSAGES DEMANDING THE RETURN OF THE PLANE AND THE PILOT. "IT'S AS IF THEY BLAME US FOR CAUSING THE INCIDENT," ORITA SAID. THE EVENT WHICH TRIGGERED THE COMMENTARY WAS A "NORTHERN TERRITORIES" RALLY IN HOKKAIOO WHICH REPORTEDLY REVIVED ANTI-SOVIET SLOGANS USED DURING THE WAR. THE ARTICLE ALSO DENOUNCED FOREIGN MINISTER MIYAZAWA'S REPORTED PLANS TO VISIT HOKKAIDO TO TAKE A PERSONAL LOOK AT THE KURILES. Attached is a proposed response to Brezhnev to his message to the President delivered on September 8.

I assume you will want to send this to Henry for his approval. But I think the reply should probably go forward in the next few days so it is out of the way before Gromyko gets here on the weekend. He may well make additional public statements (see TASS "Who Needs It?" of September 14) and it seems just as well to be on record with Brezhnev.

I have no information on the whereabouts of the pilot. When Vorontsov asked me last week whether they will be able to talk to him, in view of the "farcical" interview in Japan, I did not respond. But they might renew the effort. (We have no such obligation under existing agreements in asylum cases.)

Please note that the proposed response does not explicitly address Brezhnev's very last point about access to the air-craft since this is an issue solely between ourselves and Japan.

RECOMMENDATION

That you review this promptly and send it on to HAK for approval.

Dear Mr. General Secretary:

I have studied with attention your message which was delivered to the White House on September 8, 1976.

Your message reflects a number of misapprehensions on your part concerning the matter of the Soviet pilot who landed in Japan. There was no initiative of any kind by the United States with respect to this pilot. Upon his arrival in Japan he signified his desire to seek asylum in Using normal and accepted procedures in such cases to confirm the genuineness and voluntary character of this request, the United States Government followed its traditional policy. In view of widespread public interest in the matter, it was considered appropriate to make known, by means of a public announcement, that it had been decided to respect the wishes of the pilot. Consequently, I cannot accept the assertions in your message that the United States was either "eager" to take the pilot or "urged" him in any way to take the action he did. No action of the United States involved either violence or unlawful methods or p

I will welcome the opportunity to receive your Foreign Minister when he visits Washington and look forward to a comprehensive discussion of our relations. I am, of course, prepared to discuss the above matter with Mr. Gromyko if that is his desire but wanted to be certain even before then

that there should be no further misapprehensions on your part concerning the actual facts.

It is not of course appropriate for me to comment on aspects of this case that are entirely a matter between Japan and the Soviet Union.

May I state in conclusion that I and my Administration remain committed to the course of improved relations between our countries on the basis of reciprocity and mutual benefit and restraint. I will look forward to the talks with Mr. Gromyko in that spirit.

Belenko's Mother and Wife

The mother and wife of Lt. Belenko, the recent Soviet defector, on September 17 sent the President a telegram (at Tab A) from Khabarovsk urging that he assist in Belenko's return to the USSR. Our informal translation of the telegram is as follows:

"The President. The White House. From the mother and wife of Belenko. Our son and husband ould not voluntarily remain abroad. For us, this is a great misfortune. We earnestly ask (beg) that you render assistance in his return home. L.S. Belenko. L.P. Belenko."

The telegram, which appears to be genuine, is another example of the Soviets' great unhappiness over the episode and aching desire to get their hands on Belenko again. If all else fails, try the heartstrings.

I forward the telegram for your information. No further action is necessary.

I would note that you probably will wish to pass the telegram to CIA for the Agency's Belenko file.

THE CHARGE WAS MADE IN A WRITTEN STATEMENT OF PROTEST DELIVERED TO DEPUTY FOREIGN MINISTER KEISUKE ARITA AT THE FOREIGN OFFICE BY SOVIET AMBASSADOR TO JAPAN DMITRIY POLYANSKIY.

IT WAS THE SECOND STATEMENT FILED BY THE SOVIET UNION WITH JAMANTBENSEPTEMBER 6 INCIDENT IN WHICH THE SOVIET PILOT, LIEUTENANT VIKTOR IVANOVICH BELENKO, FLEW TO A COMMERCIAL AIRPORT IN HOKKAIDO IN A SOVIET TOP-SECRET MIG-25 COMBAT PLANE TO SEEK ASYLUM IN THE UNITED STATES.

THE PREVIOUS ONE, DEMANDING AN IMMEDIATE RETURN TO THE SOVIET UNION OF THE AIRCRAFT AND THE PILOT, WAS DELIVERED ALSO. TO ARITA BY POLYANSKIY ON SEPTEMBER 9 ONLY HOURS BEFORE THE DEFECTOR WAS FLOWN TO THE UNITED STATES.

THE LATEST STATEMENT SAID THAT THE SOVIET UNION, IN MAKING, THE DEMAND, ASKED JAPAN TO TAKE INTO CONSIDERATION THE GOODNE IGHBORLY RELATIONS BETWEEN THE TWO COUNTRIES IN MAKING THE DECISION ON THE INCIDENT.

JAPAN, HOWEVER, "CHOSE TO STRAIN THE JAPAN-SOVIET RELATIONS" BY DELIBERATELY DISREGARDING THE SOVIET DEMAND, IT SAID.

FOLLOWING REPEATED REQUESTS OF THE SOVIET UNION FOR PERMISSION TO INTERVIEW BELENKO BY A SOVIET OFFICIAL ON THE BASIS OF JAPAN-SOVIET CONSULAR AGREEMENT, THE STATEMENT SAID JAPAN FINALLY ALLOWED SUCH AN INTERVIEW SHORTLY BEFORE THE PILOT WAS HANDED OVER TO THE UNITED STATES. BUT THE INTERVIEW WAS CONDUCTED IN SUCH AN "ABNORMAL CONDITION" THAT BELENKO WAS SURROUNDED BY JAPANESE POLICEMEN AND OTHER AUTHORITIES, IT SAID.

THIS CLEARLY SHOWED THAT THE SOVIET PILOT WAS UNDER THE INFLUENCE OF "NARCOTICS" SO THAT HE COULD NOT TALK FREELY WITH THE SOVIET OFFICIAL, THE STATEMENT SAID.

UNDER SUCH CIRCUMSTANCES, THE SOVIET OFFICIAL COULD NOT CONFIRM THAT THE SOVIET PILOT WAS WISHING TO SEEK ASYLUM IN THE UNITED STATES OF HIS OWN FREE WILL, IT SAID.

THE STATEMENT CLAIMED THAT BELENKO WAS SENT TO THE UNITED STATES UNDER THE TIGHT SECURITY GUARD OF U.S. "SPECIAL SERVICE" AGENTS.

REGARDING THE AIRCRAFT, WHICH IS BEING HELD BY JAPANESE AUTHORITIES FOR INVESTIGATION INTO SUSPECTED INTRUSION OF THE JAPANESE TERRITORIAL AIR SPACE BY THE PLANE, THE STATEMENT SAID THAT JAPAN SHOULD NOT BE ALLOWED TO EXAMINE THE PLANE FREELY IN VIEW OF THE INTERNATIONAL LAWS AND PRACTICES AND THE GOOD NEIGHBORLY RELATIONS BETWEEN THE TWO COUNTRIES.

JAPAN'S CLAIM FOR THE RIGHT TO EXAMINE THE PLANE IS GROUNDLESS AND "ARTIFICIAL." THIS CAN BE PROVED CLEARLY BY THE FACT THAT A "THIRD COUNTRY" IS TAKING PART IN THE EXAMINATION OF THE PLANE, THE STATEMENT SAID.

IT SAID THAT THE PLANE IS SOVIET NATIONAL PROPERTY AND ADDED THAT JAPAN'S ACTS CONCERNING THE PLANE AND THE PILOT ARE UNLAWFUL. ALL CONSEQUENT RESPONSIBILITIES ARE TO BE BORNE BY JAPAN, THE STATEMENT SAID.

THESE "UNFRIENDLY ACTS" OF JAPAN WILL "BRING GRAVE CONSEQUENCES" IN THE PRESENT AND FUTURE RELATIONS BETWEEN THE TWO COUNTRIES, IT SAID.

AFTER POLYANSKIY READ THE STATEMENT, THE DEPUTY FOREIGN MINISTER SAID IN REPLY THAT THE STATEMENT WOULD BE DULY CONVEYED TO. FOREIGN MINISTER ZENTARO KOSAKA, ALTHOUGH "SOME POINTS IN THE STATEMENT ARE UNACCEPTABLE."

ARITA SAID THAT JAPAN WAS DEALING WITH THE INCIDENT ENTIRELY IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE INTERNATIONAL LAWS AND PRACTICES.

FOREIGN MINISTRY OFFICIALS SAID THAT THEY WILL HAVE TO STUDY THE SOVIET STATEMENT CLOSELY BEFORE DECIDING WHETHER OR NOT TO MAKE AN OFFICIAL REPLY.

THE JAPANESE NEWSPAPER "AKAHATA" TODAY ISSUED AN EDITORIAL WHICH POINTS OUT THAT THE COMMUNIST PARTY OF JAPAN IS FIRMLY PROTESTING AGAINST JAPANESE AND U.S. EXPERTS SCRUTINISING THE SOVIET MILITARY AIRCRAFT THAT MADE A LANDING IN THE TERRITORY OF JAPAN, AND IS INSISTING THAT THE AIRCRAFT BE IMMEDIATELY RETURNED TO THE SOVIET UNION. "AKAHATA" EMPHASIZES THAT THE ACTIONS OF THE JAPANESE AUTHORITIES THAT ARE GUIDED BY THE JAPANESE-U.S. MILITARY ALLIANCE, WHICH HAS TURNED INTO. A SOURCE OF HEIGHTENING TENSION IN ASIA, SUBORDINATE JAPAN'S FOREIGN POLICY TO THE JAPANESE-U.S. SECURITY TREATY.

EARLIER, MANY NEWSPAPERS IN VARIOUS COUNTRIES INCLUDING JAPAN POINTED OUT WITH GOOD REASON THAT THE JAPANESE AUTHORITIES, ACTING IN COOPERATION WITH AMERICAN SPECIAL SERVICES, ON THE PLEA OF "CONCERN FOR JAPAN'S DEFENCE," ARE STAGING IN POINT OF FACT A SABOTAGE OPERATION WHICH IS AIMED AT UNDERMINING THE DEFENCE OF THE USSR. THIS IS OPENLY SPOKEN OF BY OFFICIALS IN THE USA.
