- According to Rallis, Karamanlis is seeking a formula which would preserve the credibility of his government without doing irreparable damage to Greece's position in the Western Alliance. Rallis said the question of removal of US and NATO bases is not an issue for the time being, but some hotheads in the government are pushing the Prime Minister to take action against them. Rallis fears that Turkish obstinancy could lead to a revival of the issue in the absence of 'evidence that the US is exerting effective pressure against Turkey in behalf of an equitable settlement of the Cyprus issue. Rallis believes that Karamanlis has bought two or three weeks of respite by his rhetorical withdrawal from NATO and that the left, particularly Andress Papandreou, will pressure Karsmanlis to disengage further from NATO and the US.
- 5. Based on Rallis' remarks, the US embassy concludes that:
 - -- the Greek government will not agree to a resumption of direct talks with the Turkish government in the near future;
 - -- the question of Greek military moves on Cyprus is still under consideration with the odds favoring a Greek attempt to land reinforcements on the island;
 - --Karamanlis and Averoff, with the backing of senior ministers, want to avoid a further loosening of ties with NATO and the US but are under popular pressure to do so;
 - -- the Karamanlis government is less apprehensive of a threat from the right than it is of a threat from the left.

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

1. I MET FRIDAY EVENING WITH FOREIGN MINISTER GENSCHER, WHO HAD EARLIER INTERRUPTED HIS VACATION IN BAVARIA TO RETURN TEMPORARILY TO BONN, AND BRIEFED HIM ON CYPRUS DEVELOPMENTS PER REFTEL. STATE SECRETARY GEHLHOFF WAS ALSO PRESENT.

2. GENSCHER EXPRESSED HIS APPRECIATION FOR THE BRIEFING. HE SAID HE WAS AWARE THAT CURRENT PRESS REPORTS ALLEGING LACK OF US INITIATIVE TO DEAL WITH THE CYPRUS CRISIS WERE INACCURATE. 4. GEHLHOFF SAID HE HAD URGED MODERATION ON THE TURKISH AMBASSADOR IN A MEETING EARLIER ON FRIDAY. STRESSING GERMAN CONCERNS FOR THE SOUTH EAST FLANK OF NATO.

(@/NFD) In Turkish controlled areas, life is reported to be returning to normal at least for Turkish Cypriots. Essential supplies are arriving through Kyrenia, and postal and telephone service is being reestablished. The Turks continue work on extending the runway at the Aghirda airfield north of Nicosia. Additional Turkish Cypriot police are being recruited to aid in control of newly occupied areas. Turkish Cypriot leader Rauf Denktash reportedly said that the only subjects that could be discussed at a news conference would be relations between the two Cypriot administrations and the powers of the federal government.

- (8/NFD) Greek Internal Situation: The situation at the US Air Force facility at Iraklion, Crete remains serious with renewal of the demonstrations expected during the afternoon of 17 August. An unconfirmed report indicates that the march on the base yesterday, which resulted in over \$10,000 damage to US government property, was instigated by two visiting university students from Further unconfirmed reports indicate that during the demonstration, Greek police opened roadblocks when threatened - by the marchers. US officials have requested assistance of both local authorities and of the government in Athens. Both the Greek foreign office and the Ministry of Defense have assured US Embassy officials that all necessary precautions will be taken to protect US property throughout Greece. The local police in Iraklion have been strengthened but the local US base commander feels that Greek security forces will not be adequate to contain any concerted effort of demonstraters to attack the base. A 6th Fleet Task Group has been ordered from west of Crete to 30 miles north of the island for evacuation if required. Anti-US and anti-NATO demonstrations can be expected to continue and success of demonstrations at Iraklion could stimulate further violent protests at other US facilities in Greece.
- 3. (U) Turkish Internal Situation: The Turkish General Staff, stating that the situation has returned to normalcy, has announced that all flying and sea movement restrictions imposed on 4 August 1974 were lifted effective 0500 EDT today.



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

- 3. The Turkish advance constitutes the most serious violation of the cease-fire so far, and places Turkish forces far south of the "Attila Line" which supposedly delimits the southern boundary of Turkish territorial claims on the island.
- 4. Elsewhere, sporadic fighting was reported at Limnitis and Kokkins in the west of the island, and the Turkish commander in Famagusta reported that his forces had moved south of the city to cut Greek lines of communication.

GREECE-US

- by the ministry of foreign affairs as well as by Minister of Defense Averoff that the appropriate security officials have been instructed to provide protection to US personnel and installations and to take extra precautions in the present tense circumstances. The ambassador received similar assurances from the Athens police chief and the commanding general of the gendarmeris.
- 6. The American air station at Iraklion, Crete, reports that a large anti-American demonstration was held in the city this afternoon but that the demonstrators did not march on the base as had been feared. Greek police and army leaders on the island have promised full support in protecting the base. In addition, a US carrier group is now about 30 miles from Iraklion and is standing by to evacuate personnel should that become necessary.
- 7. Elsewhere in Greece, relations between Greek and US military personnel have moved from friendly to formal. Moreover, there are some cases in which US airmen and ships were prevented from reaching supplies and equipment, or were required to make long detours to do so. There have been some reports that US vehicles and servicemen in uniform have been stoned and verbally abused outside US bases.



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DIPLOMATIC ACTIVITY

- 8. Yugoslav Vice-President and Foreign Minister Milos Minic met today with Greek Prime Minister Karamanlis and Foreign Minister Mavros. Quoting
 diplomatic sources in Athens, UPI reports that Minic
 brought a message from Tito urging the Greeks and
 Turks to begin talking again. UPI also reports that
 Minic is scheduled to travel on to Ankara tomorrow
 to deliver Tito's message to Turkish leaders, indicating that the Yugoslavs may be seeking a mediating
 role.
- 9. An early resumption of the peace talks seems unlikely, however, as the Greeks continue to refuse to negotiate in the face of a "fait accompli." Greek political sources report that the current Greek position is that the Turkish troops must pull back to positions held on August 9--prior to the second round of fighting--before talks can resume.

CYPRIOT VIEWS

- 10. Political consultations in Nicosia intensified today. Luis Weckmann, special representative of the UN Secretary General, and Vrem Chand, commander of the UN forces on the island, met with Cypriot President Clerides in what was described as a lengthy discussion of the overall situation. No official statement was issued after the meeting but press reports state that Weckmann raised the possibility of resuming the Geneva peace talks. Weckmann and Chand will meet this evening with Turkish Cypriot leader Ecdevit Unell, who is acting vice-president in the absence of Rauf Denktash.
- 11. Press accounts state that Clerides hopes to postpone the opening of formal peace talks to give himself more time to mobilize international public opinion in support of the Greek Cypriot cause--hopefully to bring pressure on the Turks to withdraw their

Military Situation on Cyprus. The ceasefire may be deteriorating somewhat. Both the Embassy in Nicosia and the UNFICYP Commander have reported that the Turks apparently are moving south of the so-called "Attila Line." Reuters reports that Turkish armored units have cut the main road between Nicosia and the southeastern Port of Larnaca. the Turks also captured the village of Pyroi, a main Greek National Guard strongpoint, which straddles the road. Clerides called Ambassador Davies to register his concern at this major violation and to express his hope that the US can make the Turkish military comply with the assurances given both publicly and privately by the GOT.

US Embassy officers reconnoitered the Nicosia area during the afternoon and noted that UNFICYP flags and armor were "most clearly in evidence" at the Nicosia airport. Their major first impression was that relatively little damage had been done to buildings and roads. Although some reports have said that Greek Cypriots are moving back into Nicosia, the Embassy officers were unable to verify this.

Greece. The wave of anti-Americanism which has swept Greece continues to threaten US and NATO installations in the country. A number of individual reports have been filed detailing specific incidents of threats and acts against Americans and their property. The US base at Iraklion, Crete, faced with the possibility of a major anti-US demonstration, called on the Greek military for protection. The Greek Foreign and Defense Ministers have assured the US Ambassador that GOG will protect US citizens and property and take necessary precautions to avoid incidents. In any event, a US ship is standing off Crete to evacuate 1800 US citizens from the base if necessary.

The former King of Greece, Constantine, sent a message to Prime Minister Karamanlis in which he denounced the

"barbarian and shameful attack by Turkey against Cyprus," and in which he expressed deep sadness and bitterness because "neither the feelings of justice nor the alliance was able to prevent the unjust attack." In a statement made upon his return to Greece yesterday, independent leftist politician Andreas Papandreou blamed the "cynicism of Washington" and "Greece's attachment to the NATO alliance" for the division of Cyprus and Greece's troubles. He called for an end to Greece's dependence on "the US Pentagon and NATO," saying that Greece must "break the chains forged ... by American imperialism within the framework of the Atlantic alliance."

Turkey. The Turks continue to bask in the euphoria of their military victories on Cyprus. Turkish leaders headed by Prime Minister Ecevit paid a visit on the Armed Forces General Staff Headquarters to offer formal congratulations to the Turkish Chief of Staff, General Sancar, on the performance of his forces. In another development, Ecevit stated in a newspaper interview that he was opposed to partitioning Cyprus because this would "threaten detente in the Eastern Mediterranean." Ecevit also said Turkey remained ready to resume the Geneva talks with the UK and Greece "at any time" although neither of those countries had indicated any willingness to do so.

Cyprus. According to UPI reports, Cyprus Vice President Denktash warned that unless the Geneva peace conference resumes quickly, he and his fellow Turkish Cypriots will go ahead and set up their own administration on the northeastern third of Cyprus just captured by Turkey.

IT IS BECAUSE I WANT THAT RELATIONSHIP TO CONTINUE THAT I HAVE SPOKEN TO HIM OF OUR DOMESTIC LIMITATIONS AND THE NEED FOR A GENEROUS GESTURE FROM THE TURKISH GOVERNMENT TO BRING THE DISPUTING PARTIES BACK TO THE NEGOTIATING TABLE. I WOULD WELCOME THE PRIME MINISTER'S VIEWS. KISSINGER

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

FROM THE SECRETARY FOR THE AMBASSADOR

IT IS CLEAR FROM YOUR TALK WITH KARAMANLIS AND THE DCH'S TALK WITH RALLIS THAT THE TIME HAS COME FOR SOME LESS FORMAL AND MORE FRANK AND DIRECT EXCHANGES WITH KARAMANLIS. YOU SHOULD THEREFORE SEEK A MEETING WITH HIM TOMORROW AND READ THE FOLLOWING POINTS (BUT LEAVE NO PIECE OF PAPER). YOU SHOULD INFORM KARAMAMLIS THAT THE MAIN LINES OF THIS MESSAGE HAVE BEEN GONE OVER BY THE PRESIDENT.

I HAVE BEEN ASKED TO DISCUSS THE CURRENT STATE OF OUR . RELATIONS AND TO SHARE WITH YOU THE SECRETARY'S ASSESSMENT. OF THE PRESENT SITUATION. OUR PURPOSE IS TO DETERMINE HOW QUE MUTUAL INTERESTS CAN BE STRENGTHENED. TAKING ACCOUNT OF UNR COMMON DESIRE TO SEE A SETTLEMENT OF THE CYPRUS PROBLEM ACHIEVED WHICH IS JUST AND FAIR TO ALL PARTIES AND WHICH, AS THE PRIME MINISTER HAS SO ELDQUENTLY STATED, UPON WAYS AND MEANS THAT RETAIN





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GREEK MONOP. WE CAN WELL UNDERSTAND THAT AN IMMEDIATE RETURN TO THE CONFERENCE TABLE UNDER PRESENT CONDITIONS IN CYPRUS WOULD BE UNACCEPTABLE TO THE GREEK GOVERNMENT.

WE ALSO ASSUME THAT THE PRIME MINISTER SHARES OUR CONCERN THAT THE GREATEST DANGER IN THE PRESENT SITUATION WOULD BE THE SUCCESS OF LEFT WING AND COMMUNIST PRESSURES ON THE PRESENT GREEK GOVERNMENT TO TURN AWAY FROM A PROPERST AND ALLIANCE-DRIENTED POLICY. THE PRIME MINISTER CAN BE ASSURED THAT WE ARE AWARE OF THESE DANGERS AND THAT WE ARE DOING OUR UTMOST TO CONVINCE THE TURKISH GOVERNMENT THAT THE LIMITS OF THE PRESENT GREEK GOVERNMENT'S ABILITY TO MOVE TOWARD'A NEGOTIATED SOLUTION HAVE BEEN REACHED.

WE CAN UNDERSTAND THE DISAPPOINTMENT AND FRUSTRATION THAT THE GREEK GOVERNMENT AND PEOPLE FREL AT THE PRESUMED INABILITY OF THE U.S., DESPITE ITS INTENSIVE EFFORTS OVER THE COURSE OF THIS CRISIS, TO PREVENT TURKISH MILITARY ACTION. ON THE OTHER HAND, IT IS TOTALLY UNJUSTIFIED FUR THE BLAME TO BE LAID ON THE U.S. NOR OD WE IT IS IN THE INTEREST OF GREECE TO DO SO. AS C AS CLOSE AND FRIENDLY ALLIES, WE BELIEVE IT IS IMPORTANT FOR BOTH OF US TO REMEMBER THAT THIS CRISIS WAS NOT OF OUR MAKING OR OF THE KARAMANLIS GOVERNMENT. BOTH GREECE THE U.S AND WERE PUT IN THE SITUATION IN WHICH WE NOW FIND TRRESPONSTBLE AND UNWISE ACTIONS OF THE GREEK UPSETTING THE BALANCE OF FORCES ON CYPRUS.

THE PRIME MINISTER MUST BE AWARE OF OUR CONSTANT AND INTENSIVE EFFORTS TO MODERATE THE TURKISH POSITION FROM THE BEGINNING OF THE CRISIS TO THE PRESENT TIME WITH SEVERAL DAILY DEMARCHES IN ANKARA. CJUST TODAY I HAVE MADE A MOST VIGOROUS PROTEST TO THE TURKISH GOVERNMENT A RESULT OF REPORTS THAT THEY ARE CONTINUING TO OCCUPY MORE TERRITORY.) HE DID SUCCEED IN DELAYING TURKISH ACTION FOR SEVERAL DAYS LAST WEEK AND MIGHT HAVE ACHIEVED EVEN MORE IF SOME DEGREE OF FLEXIBILITY HAD DEVELOPED AMONG THE PARTIES IN GENEVA WHICH WOULD HAVE ENABLED US TO POINT TO SOME MOVEMENT IN THE NEGOTIATIONS'. HE ARE CON-V LUCEU THAT ONLY THE UNITED STATES WUULD HAVE PREVENTED TURKISH ACTION LAST WEEK! THIS WAS

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A COURSE OF ACTION WHICH WOULD HAVE BEEN TOTALLY UNACCEPT-ABLE TO OUR CONGRESS AND PUBLIC. FURTHERMORE, IT WOULD HAVE USEN DIRECTED AGAINST A NATO ALLY.

CUPHENT GREEK COMESTIC SITUATION, WE ASSUME THAT GREECE IS IN THE NATO ALLIANCE IN FURTHERANCE OF ITS COMESTIC SITUATION, WE ASSUME THAT GREECE IS IN THE NATO ALLIANCE IN FURTHERANCE OF ITS COMESTIC INTERESTS. THE U.S. HAS AN INTEREST IN A STRONG NATO WITH GREECE AS AN ACTIVE AND EFFECTIVE PARTMER, AND I AM SURE THE PRIME MINISTER WOULD AGREE THAT GREECE'S NEED IN THIS REGARD IS AT LEAST AS GREAT AS THAT OF THE U.S. HE BELIEVE THEREFORE THAT IT IS IN OUR MUTUAL INTEREST NOT TO

DWELL ON THE DISAPPOINTMENTS OF THE PRESENT, BUT TO FOCUS PROMPTLY ON HOW BEST IN THE FUTURE TO FORGE TOGETHER A CLOSE AND COOPERATIVE RELATIONSHIP THAT SERVES OUR MUTUAL INTERESTS.

- 6. WE RECOGNIZE THAT THE PRIME MINISTER IS A BETTER JUDGE OF THE DOMESTIC SITUATION IN GREECE THAN WE ARE BUT FROM A FURLIGN POLICY POINT OF VIEW THE CONTINUED GROWTH OF ANTI-AMERICANISM CAN ONLY MAKE IMPOSSIBLE THE MUTUALLY PRODUCTIVE RELATIONSHIP HE WISH TO ESTABLISH. FURTHER-MORE THIS ANTI-AMERICANISM WILL IN THE LONG TERM HELP ONLY THE FXTREME LEFT AND UNDERMINE EVEN KARAMANLIS! POSITION. WE WANT TO SUPPORT AND STRENGTHEN YOUR GOVERNMENT WHICH IS THE BEST GOVERNMENT GREECE HAS HAD IN PAST 12 YEARS. WE ALSO RECOGNIZE THAT YOU YOURSELF HAVE BEEN RESTHAINED BUT HE ARE DISTURBED BY THE TRENDS OF ANTI-AMERICANISM, THE TOTAL IMPACT OF WHICH IS TO BLAME THE UNITED STATES FOR ALL THE ILLS OF THE PRESENT SITUATION. WE MUST TELL YOU IN ALL FRIENDSHIP THAT CONTINUATION OF THIS TREND PLUS CONTINUING PUBLIC INCIDENTS AND ATTACKS WILL UNDERMINE OUR ABILITY TO PLAY A POSITIVE ROLE.
- 7. WE ARE PREPARED TO SEARCH TOGETHER FOR ELEMENTS OF AN EVENTUAL SETTLEMENT WHICH ENABLE THE GREEK AND TURKISH COMMUNITIES TO DETERMINE THEIR OWN FUTURE, PRESERVE GREEK HONGO AND CONVINCE THE TURKISH GOVERNMENT THAT IT CAN FIND A SOLUTION TO THE CYPRUS PROBLEM WITHIN A FRAMEWORK OF COMPROMISE AND BETTER RELATIONS WITH GREECE. YOU CAN BE

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ASSURED THAT WE SHALL STRONGLY PRESS THE TURKISH GOVERNMENT TO MAKE PROPOSALS THAT TAKE ACCOUNT OF THE LEGITIMATE
CONCERNS OF GREECE AND OF THE GHEEK CYPRIOTS. NONE OF US
WILL GAIN, HOWEVER. TO ANY STOP INSISTS PUBLICLY ON
UNACHIEVABLE GOALS OR MAKES ITS TRADITIONAL FRIENDS THE
TARGET FOR UNJUSTIFIED ATTACKS.

A SEARCH FOR THESE POSITIVE ELEMENTS MAY TAKE TIME, WE WILL NOT PRESS YOU ON THE QUESTION OF TIMING BUT IT IS A FACT THAT THE LONGER TALKS ARE DELAYED, THE MORE THE STATUS QUO WILL TEND TO BE CONFIRMED. OUR MOST IMMEDIATE PROBLEM WILL BE TO FIND A MEANS TO PREVENT THE SITUATION FROM DETERIORATING FURTHER. WHAT WOULD BE MOST USEFUL TO ME HOULD BE A FRANK APPRAISAL FROM THE PRIME MINISTER OF HOW THE UNITED STATES CAM BEST USE ITS INFLUENCE TO MAKE PROGRESS ON THIS SEARCH FOR A SOLUTION. IF WE BOTH UNDER STAND BETTER THE REALISTIC LIMITS OF OUR OWN ACTIONS, I BELIEVE WE WILL BE BETTER ABLE TO WORK IN COMMON TOWARD THE SOLUTION WE BOTH DESIRE.

9. WE WOULD BE PREPARED TO SEND A PERSONAL REPRESENTATIVE TO ATHEMS TO PURSUE THESE THOUGHTS IN MORE DETAIL WITH THE PRIME MINISTER. KISSINGER

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
