	AS YOU KNOW, IT IS HOPED THAT AMBASSADOR GATES WILL HAVE A SUBSTANTIVE MEETING WITH PREMIER HUA NOT TOO LONG AFTER HIS ARRIVAL. WE HAVE POUCHED (REGISTRY 3065082 IN CLASSIFIED POUCH WHICH LEFT WASHINGTON APRIL 30) PRESIDENT FORD'S LETTER TO HUA INTRODUCING AMBASSADOR GATES, POUCH SHOULD REACH YOU ABOUT MAY 6, IF YOU DO NOT RECEIVE IT ABOUT THEN, LET US KNOW.
	FOLLOWING IS OUR TENTATIVE SCENARIO FOR OBTAINING MEETING WITH HUA: AMBASSADOR GATES WILL REQUEST COURTESY CALL ON FOREIGN MINISTER CHMIAO FHROUGH NORMAL PROCEDURE. IN THAT CALL, MEAWILL ATTEMPT TO AVOID A DERERAL TOUR DIMORIZON OF THE TYPE CONTEMPLATED FOR MEETING WITH HUA. ME WILL EXPRESS HUPE THAT IT WILL BE POSSIBLE FOR HIM TO MEET WITH HUA AND SAY THAT HE HAS A LETTER FROM PRESIDENT FORD TO HUA. IF CHMIAO ASKS THAT LETTER BE GIVEN TO HIM FOR DELIVERY, ME SECRET



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BELIEVE THAT AMBASSADOR GATES WILL HAVE TO COMPLY. OTHER-

WISE, IF AMBASSADOR GATES IS GIVEN AN APPOINTMENT WITH HUA, HE WILL SEND THE LETTER THROUGH THE FOREIGN MINISTRY A DAY IN ADVANCE, SO IT CAN BE TRANSLATED AND READ BY HUA EEFORE THE MEETING. IF AMBASSADOR GATES IS NOT GIVEN AN APPOINTMENT WITHIN THREE TO FOUR WEEKS, HE WILL REPORT BACK FOR INSTRUCTIONS.

FOLLOHING ARE APPROVED TALKING POINTS FOR MEETING WITH HUA. THESE WERE REVIEWED BY AMBASSADOR GATES BEFORE HIS DEPARTURE, BUT WE SAID THAT AFTER HE LODKS THEM OV"R AGAIN IN PEKING, HE COULD LET US KNOW IF HE HAD ANY FURTHER THOUGHTS OR NEEDED ADDITIONAL BACKGROUND ON ANY POINTS: WE WILL UPDATE THE TALKING POINTS AS REQUIRED BY DEVELOPMENTS,

BEGIN TEXT TALKING POINTS

1. I VELCOME THIS OPPORTUNITY TO MEET WITH YOU. I LOOK FORWARD TO MY STAY IN PEKING AND TO HORKING WITH YOUR GOVERNMENT TO PROMOTE THE MUTUAL INTERESTS OUR TWO COUNTRIES HAVE REGARDING BOTH VARIOUS GLOBAL MATTERS AND OUR BILATERAL RELATIONS.

2. PRESIDENT FORD HAS ASKED ME TO CONVEY TO YOU PERSONALLY HIS CONGRATULATIONS AND GOOD WISHES ON YOUR APPOINTMENT AS PREMIER. I WOULD LIKE TO ADD MY OWN CONGRATULATIONS.

3. I BELIEVE YOU HAVE RECEIVED THE LETTER FROM PRESIDENT FORD WHICH I BROUGHT WITH ME, IN WHICH HE EXPRESSED THE HOPE THAT WE COULD EXCHANGE VIEWS ON BOTH INTERNATIONAL MATTERS AND OUR BILATERAL RELATIONSHI,,

4. AS PRESIDENT FORD HAD EXTENSIVE DISCUSSIONS ON MANY OF THESE MATTERS DURING HIS VISIT TO PEKING IN DECEMBER, I WILL NOT COVER ALL OF THE SAME GROUND AGAIN. HOWEVER, HE HAS ASKED ME TO REITERATE SEVERAL BASIC POINTS, AS WELL AS TO COMMENT ON SOME RECENT DEVELOPMENTS IN THE WORLD.

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5. FOREMOST AMONG THESE IS OUR POLICY TOWARDS THE SOVIET UNION. BECAUSE OF DIFFERING CIRCUMSTANCES, OUR THO COUNTRIES HAVE SOMEWHAT DIFFERENT POLICIES, AND WE RESPECT THE DECISION YOUR COUNTRY HAS MADE REGARDING YOUR POLICY, FOR OUR PART, WE HAVE A DUAL POLICY. WHILE WE WISH TO IMPROVE OUR BILATERAL RELATIONS WITH THE USSR AND STABILIZE THE INTERNATIONAL SYSTEM, THE UNITED STATES IS DETERMINED TO RESIST SOVIET EXPANSIONISM==AN OBJECTIVE WHICH OUR TWO COUNTRIES SHARE EVEN IF OUR TACTICS MAY DIFFER.

AS YOU MAY KNOW, SOME YEARS AGO I SERVED IN THE δ. DEPARTMENT OF DEFENSE, INCLUDING A PERIOD AS SECRETARY OF DEFENSE, AND I HAVE HAIDTAINED MY INTEREST IN US DEFENSE MATTERS. I CAN THEREFORE SPEAK FROM PERSONAL EXPERIENCE ABOUT THE DETERMINATION OF THE UNITED STATES TO HAINTAIN A STRONG HILITARY POSTURE. PRESIDENT FORD AND SECRETARY KISSINGER ARE ABSOLUTELY COMMITTED TO THIS GOAL WHICH IS REFLECTED IN THE PRESIDENT'S CURRENT DEFENSE BUDGET. DESPITE SOME OF THE RHETORIC IN OUR ELECTION PROCESS, THE US CLEARLY REMAINS THE NUMBER ONE POWER IN THE WORLD IN TERMS OF MILITARY, ECONOMIC AND TECHNOLOGICAL POWER. WE INTEND TO REMAIN SO. AND IT APPEARS THAT THE CONGRESS IS NOW INCREASING ITS SUPPORT TO THIS END.

7. WE HAVE NO ILLUSIONS ABOUT THE SOVIET UNION, AND ON THIS POINT ALSO, THERE IS GROWING AWARENESS AMONG THE AMERICAN PEOPLE OF THE SOVIET UNION'S HEGEMONIC AMBITIONS.

8. AS YOU KNOW FROM YOUR OWN COUNTRY'S EXPERIENCE, IN A COMPLEX AND GLOBAL MATTER SUCH AS THIS ONE, THERE WILL BE OCCASIONAL SETBACKS AS WELL AS SUCCESSES. THE OUTCOME IN ANGOLA HAS SUCH A SETBACK TO OUR MUTUAL INTERESTS. IF WE, TOGETHER WITH OTHER COUNTRIES, HAD BEEN ABLE TO CONTINUE OUR SUPPORT OF THE ANTI-SOVIET ELEMENTS IN ANGOLA, THE OUTCOME WOULD HAVE BEEN DIFFERENT.

9. WE HAVE MADE IT CLEAR TO THE SOVIET UNION, BOTH PUBLICLY AND PRIVATELY, THAT WE WILL REACT STRONGLY TO SECRET

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FURTHER EFFORTS BY THE SOVIETS TO EXPAND THEIR INFLUENCE BY HILITARY MEANS OR MILITARY PRESSURE WHETHER DIRECTLY OR, AS IN ANGOLA, THROUGH SUPPLY OF MILITARY EQUIPMENT AND SUPPORT OF THE CUBAN TROOPS. WE HAVE ALSO STATED THAT FURTHER SOVIET ACTIONS LIKE THEIR INTERVENTION IN ANGOLA ARE BOUND TO HAVE A SERIOUS EFFECT ON OUR BILATERAL RELATIONS.

10. WE HAVE ALSO MADE IT CLEAR THAT THE UNITED STATES WILL NOT ACCEPT FURTHER CUBAN MILITARY INTERVENTION ABROAD. WE ARE CONCERNED BY THE CONTINUED PRESENCE OF CUBAN TROOPS IN ANGOLA AND BY THE POSSIBILITY THAT THEY WILL BE USED ELSEWHERE. WE WOULD WELCOME YOUR ASSESS NENT OF SOVIET/CUBAN ACTIVITIES IN SOUTHERN AFRICA.

11. SECRETARY KISSINGER'S TRIP TO AFRICA HAS DESIGNED TO STRENGTHEN OUR TIES NITH THE AFRICAN NATIONS. WE ARE PURSUING A DUAL-TRACK POLICY OF VIGOROUSLY SUPPORTING MAJORITY RULE IN SOUTHERN AFRICA AND MARNING AGAINST SOVIET/CUBAN INTERVENTION. OUR OBJECTIVE IS THAT AFRICAN COUNTRIES SOLVE THEIR OWN PROBLEMS FREE OF OUTSIDE INTERFERENCE.

12. THE FURTHER CHANGE IN EGYPT'S RELATIONSHIP WITH THE SOVIETS IS A MAJOR FAVORABLE DEVELOPMENT. IT WAS A COURAGEOUS AND STATESHANLIKE MOVE BY ,RESIDENT SADAT, AND IS UNDOUBTEDLY VIENED BY THE SOVIETS AS A MAJOR SET-BACK. WE BELIEVE THAT THE RELATIONSHIP OF TRUST WHICH WE HAVE BUILT WITH :GYPT HELPED TO MAKE IT POSSIBLE FOR PRESIDENT SADAT TO TAKE THAT STEP.

13. WE ARE GRATIFIED THAT YOUR GOVERNMENT HAS RESPONDED TO PRESIDENT SADAT'S REQUEST FOR MILITARY EQUIPMENT, AND HOPE THAT YOU WILL FIND IT POSSIBLE TO CONTINUE THAT AID. WE ARE PROVIDING SOME TRANSPORT AIRCRAFT, AND PRESIDENT SADAT UNDERSTANDS WHY WE CANNOT DO MORE THIS YEAR. WE HOPE TO PROVIDE MORE MILITARY AID IN THE FUTURE.

14. WITH RESPECT TO THE ARAB-ISRAEL DISPUTE, WE ARE GUIETLY CONTINUING OUR EFFORTS WITH THE PARTIES SECRET

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CONCERNED TO LAY THE GROUNDWORK FOR FURTHER STEPS TOWARDS A SETTLEMENT. IT REMAINS A DIFFICULT PROBLEM, AND WE DO NOT EXPECT A MAJOR BREAKTHROUGH IN THE NEAR FUTURE. HOWEVER, THE US REMAINS DETERMINED TO HELP MAINTAIN THE NEGOTIATING PROCESS AND REALIZES THE DANGER OF STAGNATION-BOTH IN TERMS OF POSSIBLE CONFLICT AND THE SOVIET ROLE. IT REMAINS OUR PURPOSE TO PREVENT THE SOVIETS FROM INJECTING THEMSELVES INTO THE PROCESS IN A NAY THAT WOULD INCREASE THEIR INFLUENCE.

15. ALTHOUGH SYRIA HAS TAKEN A HARDER POSITION THAN EGYPT REGARDING A SETTLEMENT WITH ISRAEL, WE HAVE WELCOMED SYRIA'S EFFORTS TO HELP RESOLVE THE CIVIL STRIFE IN LEBANON. PRESIDENT FORD SENT A SPECIAL EMISSARY, AMBASSADOR BROWN, TO LEBANON TO SUPPORT THOSE EFFORTS. WE THINK PROGRESS HAS BEEN MADE AND IN A MANNER THAT HAS REDUCED SOVIET INFLUENCE.

16. DUR RELATIONS WITH CUR EUROPEAN ALLIES REMAINS VERY STRONG. IN ADDITION TO DUR JOINT DEFENSE EFFORTS, THE ALLIANCE IS BEING STRENGTHENED BY UNPRECEDENTED POLITICAL AND ECONOMIC COOPERATION AND COORDINATION.

THE DEFENSE OF EUROPE AND CLOSE TRANS-ATLANTIC TIES ARE PARAMOUNT US INTERESTS AND WILL BE VIGOROUSLY UPHELD.

17. THE SOUTHERN EUROPE SITUATION IS THE MOST TROUBLE. SOME. PORTUGAL IS NOT YET STABLE, BUT THE INFLUENCE OF THE PORTUGESE COMMUNIST PARTY, AND THEREFORE SOVIET INFLUENCE, HAS BEEN FURTHER REDUCED.

18. REGARDING SPAIN, FRANCO'S DEATH HAS CREATED LESS INSTABILITY THAN SOME EXPECTED. WE HAVE NEGOTIATED A RENEWAL OF OUR AGREEMENT WITH SPAIN ON OUR NILITARY FACILITIES, AND ARE HOPEFUL THAT IT WILL BE RATIFIED BY OUR SENATE.

19. WE HAVE MADE IT CLEAR TO OUR EUROPEAN FRIENDS, THAT WE WOULD VIEW INCLUSION IN THEIR GOVERNMENTS OF COMMUNIST PARTIES LINKED TO MOSCOW AS SERIOUSLY DETRIMENTAL TO OUR MUTUAL SECURITY INTERESTS.

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20. WE HAVE RECENTLY NEGOTIATED AN OVERALL AGREEMENT WITH TURKEY REGARDING OUR MILITARY FACILITIES THERE AND MILITARY ASSISTANCE, AND ARE NOW NEGOTIATING A SIMILAR AGREEMENT WITH GREECE. BOTH AGREEMENTS WILL REQUIRE COMGRESSIONAL APPROVAL, AND THIS MAY TAKE SOME TIME. HOWEVER, THESE DEVELOPMENTS, AND A BETTER PROSPECT FOR IMPROVED RELATIONS BETWEEN GREECE AND TURKEY, SHOULD STRENGTHEN SIGNIFICANTLY NATO'S SOUTHERN FLANK.

21. I WOULD LIKE TO HENTION SEVERAL DEVELOPMENTS IN ASIA, WE HAVE OF COURSE NOTED YOUR RECENT AGREEMENT WITH INDIA TO EXCHANGE AMBASSADORS, WE ASSUME THIS DID NOT PLEASE MOSCOW, BUT WOULD WELCOME YOUR VIEWS ON THIS POINT, AS WELL AS WHETHER YOU EXPECT INDIA TO SUGGEST OTHER STEPS TO IMPROVE ITS RELATIONSHIP WITH YOUR COUNTRY, WE WOULD ALSO WELCOME YOUR ASSESSMENT OF INDIA'S GESTURES TOWARD PAKISTAN.

22. WITH RESPECT TO JAPAN, OUR RELATIONS ARE IN VERY GOOD SHAPE AND OUR CONSULTATION HAS NEVER BEEN CLOSER. A TROUBLESOME DEVELOPMENT THERE HAS BEEN THE SO-CALLED LOCKHEED AFFAIR. BUT WE HAVE BEEN WORKING CLOSELY WITH THE JAPANESE GOVERNMENT TO RESOLVE THE PROBLEM, AND WE ARE CONFIDENT THAT IT WILL NOT HAVE A LASTING EFFECT ON OUR CONTINUING CLOSE RELATIONSHIP.

23. IN THAILAND, WE HAVE BEEN REVISING OUR MILITARY PRESENCE TO TAKE ACCOUNT OF THE CHANGED SITUATION IN SOUTHEAST ASIA AND TO MINIMIZE THE POSSIBILITY FOR THOSE UNFRIENDLY TO THE US, INCLUDING THE SOVIETS, TO EXPLOIT

THE SITUATION. HOWEVER, THE DETAILS OF OUR HILITARY Relations with thailand will have to be negotiated with The New thai government.

24. WE HAVE BEEN NEGOTIATING WITH THE PHILIPPINES REGARDING OUR ECONOMIC AND MILITARY RELATIONSHIPS. WE ARE CONFIDENT THAT BY RESOLVING SOME OF THE ISSUES THAT HAVE ARISEN WITH THE PASSAGE OF TIME, OUR RELATIONSHIP WITH THE PHILIPPINES WILL BE EVEN STRONGER THAN IT IS SECRET





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NOW,

25. SOME WEEKS AGD, AS WE INFORMED YOUR GOVERNMENT THROUGH YOUR LIAISON OFFICE IN WASHINGTON, WE MADE A PROPOSAL TO MORTH VIET-NAM TO HOLD TALKS TO EXPLORE THE POSSIBILITY OF IMPROVING RELATIONS BETWEEN OUR TWO COUNTRIES. OUR PROPOSAL WAS A SERIOUS ONE. HOWEVER, HANOI'S RESPONSE, BY RESURRECTING THE PARIS AGREEMENT CLAUSE ABOUT ECONOMIC ASSISTANCE AFTER HAVING KILLED THE AGREEMENT BY ITS MILITARY ACTION LAST YEAR, SUGGESTS TO US THAT HANDI IS NOT NOW INTERESTED IN IMPROVING RELATIONS. OUR OPH ATTITUDE WILL OF COURSE BE STRONGLY INFLUENCED NOT ONLY BY BILATERAL MATTERS BUT ALSO BY HHETHER HORTH VIET-NAM ACTS WITH RESTRAINT TOWARDS THE NEIGHBORING COUNTRIES IN SOUTHEAST ASIA. WE YOULD WELCOME YOUR THOUGHTS ON THIS POINT.

26. REGARDING KOREA, OUR PRIMARY CONCERN REMAINS THAT THERE HE NO DEVELOPMENTS WHICH WOULD HEIGHTEN TENSION BETWEEN NORTH AND SOUTH KOREA. WE CONTINUE TO HOPE THAT WAYS CAN BE FOUND OVER TIME TO REDUCE THOSE TENSIONS. IN THE MEANTIME, WE INTEND TO MAINTAIN OUR MILITARY PRESENCE AS WE BELIEVE IT CONTRIBUTES TO STABILITY IN THE KOREAN PENINSULA.

27. LET ME CONCLUDE WITH A FEW BRIEF REMARKS ABOUT OUR BILATERAL RELATIONS,

28. IN HIS MESSAGE TO YOU UPON YOUR APPOINTMENT AS PREMIER, AND IN THE LETTER I BROUGHT WITH ME, PRESIDENT FORD REAFFIRMED OUR COMMITMENT TO COMPLETE THE PROCESS OF NORMALIZING RELATIONS BETWEEN OUR TWO COUNTRIES. HE HAS ASKED ME TO REITERATE THAT THAT IS OUR FIRM POLICY AND TO SAY THAT HE IS CONFIDENT THAT IMPOUGH OUR JOINT EFFORTS WE CAN ACHIEVE THE OBJECTIVE OF FULLY NORMALIZED RELATIONS.

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

Chinese Politics a Month After Teng Hsiao-p'ing's Demise: Central Authority Continues to Dissipate; The Soviets Wait Hopefully on the Sidelines, Waving to Their "Friends"

One month after the purging of Vice Premier Teng Hsiao-p'ing, Peking's political scene shows no signs of returning to "normal". Anomalies in the public appearance pattern of senior leaders suggests continuing tensions and uncertainties of role among the central elite. Cadres are grumbling privately -- and to foreigners -- about Chairman Mao's willful behavior in purging Teng; and the military has been put on heightened alert against "counter-revolutionary" acts. In sum, China's domestic politics show every sign of suffering from a serious dissipation of central authority, continuing factional tension within the Politburo, and the prospect for further trouble.

Regarding foreign policy, on the one hand Peking has pursued actively its efforts to undercut the Soviet presence around the world, as was indicated by the re-establishment of ambassadorial level contacts with the Indians in mid-April, and the signing on April 21 of a military assistance agreement with Egyp: during the visit of Vice President Mubarak. At the same time, the unprecedented explosion outside the Soviet Embassy on April 29, in combination with heightened propaganda noises from Moscow just preceding the explosion, suggests some counterplay on the issue of easing Sino-Soviet tensions -- or at least active Chinese efforts to forestall Soviet efforts to play on their internal instability.

Regarding relations with the US, the Chinese responded to the departure for Peking of our new Liaison Office Chief Thomas Gates by returning a reluctant Huang Chen to Washington, thus meticulously maintaining equivalence in the levels of representation in our respective capitals.

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Chinese media gave special notice to three positive public statements by President Ford on US-PRC relations in an April 16 article in one of their Hong Kong papers, but at the same time took the unprecedented step of publicly criticizing US foreign policy in an April 21 attack on the "Sonnenfeidt Doctrine". They also made a low-key protest to us on May 2 regarding routine US naval aircraft surveillance of two of their ocean research vessels operating for the first time near the Fiji Islands.

The Dissipation of Domestic Political Discipline

We have now accumulated reliable evidence from multiple diplomatic reporting which indicates that the April 5 demonstrations just prior to Teng Hsiao-p'ing's downfall were well planned and widely organized within Peking's governmental bureaucracy, and were paralleled by demonstrations in other Chinese cities. Indeed, we have several reports that cadre hosting foreign visitors urged them to go to Tien An Men Square on April 5 where, they were told, they "would see something interesting happen".

The decisive action of the leadership on April 7 in purging Teng and elevating Hua Kuo-feng permanently to the Premiership thus has the quality of an effort by Mao and other leaders at the center to prevent a widespread and violent mass confrontation over the question of a successor to Chou En-lai. This impression is reenforced by the series of counterrallies which were organized throughout the country following Teng's ouster. Two weeks of rather manic demonstrations and propaganda activities in support of the Central Committee's decision to purge Teng and elevate Hua, in which the military played a highly visible role, seemed designed to submerge broad support for Teng (or at least dampen widespread public doubts generated by the unexpected removal of the Vice Premier, and cope with growing unease among the cadre about a reradicalization of the political scene and the possibility of a widespread purge).

In the three weeks following Teng's ouster, the "leftist" elements within the leadership who led the attack on the Vice Premier dropped from public sight, presumably to lower their profile and minimize a popular reaction against them. At the same time, leaders on the right identified with Teng (such as Vice Premiers Li Hsien-nien and Chen Yung-kuei) and centrist officials (such as Chi Teng-kuei and, of course, Premier Hua) maintained active public appearances, evidently to reassure the public that Teng's purge would not be followed by a widespread elimination of his followers. This pattern was reenforced by the appearance on

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health. The Muldoon meeting was limited to 15 minutes, and Mao was characterized by the visitors as being very frail and almost inarticulate. He impressed the New Zealanders as being near death.

Another curious anomaly in the Chairman's position has been the nonparticipation in the three most recent Mao meetings with foreigners of Nancy Tang, who has been consistently in attendance at these sessions for the past four years. Miss Tang was replaced in the Muldoon meeting by Chi Ch'ao-chu, who had been chief interpreter at the PRC Liaison Office in Washington, and was an active Mao interpreter during the 1960s. We are unable to account for this shift in appearance pattern but assume that it reflects some sensitivity on the question of direct access to Mao.

If we were to summarize China's internal situation at this time, the evidence suggests that the divisiveness within the central leadership is now paralleled by an increasingly sullen and potentially explosive public mood, as China's population reacts with disbelief and unease to the unsettling changes in the Party leadership. Dissipation of Mao's authority is producing paralysis at the lower levels of the bureaucracy, which in turn is reenforcing incidents of local factionalism and loss of public discipline which ---- have been quite widespread in the past six weeks. Mao himself is reported to be concerned about this situation. recently sent a letter to senior Party leaders warning them of the possibility of a "reactionary coup attempt"following his death. 25X1

The key to whether this nasty public mood will lead to widespread disorder is a function of the future course of the leadership struggle. Continuing pressure by the radicals for a broadening of the purge is likely to heighten the strains at the center and throughout the society; and the death of Mao could very well provide the catalyst for a major blood-letting. The role of the military remains critical in this situation, and the unstable appearance patterns of Marshall Yeh Chien-ying (still, as far as we know, China's Defense Minister, but not formally identified as such) and Chen Hsi-lien (whose position as Commander of the Peking Military Region is also obscure) indicate that the military itself remains divided. The army is thus likely to play a critical, swing-role as the instability in the political leadership plays itself out.

The Soviets "Wave" Expectantly Over the Border

The unprecedented April 29 explosion at the Soviet Embassy in Peking, which reportedly killed two PLA security guards and one or more Chinese who carried the bomb, could be -- as China's authorities claim -- simply the work of a "mad counter-revolutionary". At the same time it also seems quite likely that the incident is a reflection of Peking's reaction to Soviet efforts to play on their domestic political instability through propaganda activities.

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April 17 of Marshall Yeh Chien-ying, who had been absent from public view for three months (since mid-January) and was reported to have stalked off in anger when Teng's promotion to the Premiership was blocked in late January. Yeh has not been directly identified as Defense Minister since his reappearance, however.

On April 26 Peking's political mood took a sharp turn to the left with a large rally held in honor of the military "heroes" who had suppressed the demonstrations three weeks earlier. The rally marked the return to public view of all those identified as the Party's radical faction: Mao's wife Chiang Ching, the young Wang Hung-wen, ideologue Yao Wen-yuan, and Chang Ch'un-ch'iao. Moderate leaders Yeh Chien-ying, Li Hsien-nien, and Chu Teh were notable by their absence. The rally also marked the onset of harsher media polemics hinting at the need to broaden the attack on Teng by rooting out his followers. A series of <u>People's Daily</u> and <u>Red Flag</u> articles of late April and early May stressed the fact that the April 5 "counter-revolutionary" political incident at Tien An Men Square was "neither isolated nor accidental" and that it was necessary to "detect ^{25X1} in depth all counter-revolutionary activities, and resolutely suppress all counter-revolutionaries". At the same time,

the Party leadership had established a "rumor suppression and investigation headquarters" to cope with the problem of identifying those who had organized the widespread demonstration in support of Teng, and who continued to spread divisive propaganda throughout the country -- such as a purported last will of deceased Premier Chou En-lai.

Mao's Authority Sharply Declines

Paralleling the widespread signs of leadership instability and conflict over the past month has been a remarkable series of indications that the prestige of Chairman Mao has declined sharply in the wake of the purging of Teng Hsiao-p'ing. ______ nearly a dozen instances of Party officials criticizing Mao -- sometimes in private, and other times openly to foreigners -- in which the Chairman is characterized as a senile old man who is nepotistically trying to insure the continuation of his dynasty by promoting the fortunes of his wife. The cadre assert that Mao no longer inspires confidence in China, that he is as selfish as the late Chou En-lai was selfless, and that China might be better off if the Chairman stepped down from power. Chiang Ching is characterized as a "neurotic old woman".

At the same time, the report of New Zealand Prime Minister Muldoon's April 30 meeting with Mao suggests the Chairman is in seriously declining

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Two weeks before the explosion, Moscow's Chinese-language "Radio Peace and Progress" concluded an unusual five-article series of commentaries on the efforts of Mao's wife to "usurp" the throne of political leadership in China. Madame Chiang was characterized in the commentaries as an ambitious prostitute who was trying to manipulate her senile husband and take over Party leadership. The Russian broadcasts compared Chiang Ching to the last Empress Dowager, who was "the incarnation of debauchery, cruelty and evil". It is conceivable that the Madame, outraged by this Soviet effort to play on the anti-Chiang Ching sentiment which so clearly surfaced during the May 5 demonstrations, decided to send the Russians a message.

An alternative, but not necessarily contradictory, accounting for the explosion is related to an April 28 <u>Pravda</u> commentary under the authoritative pseudonym of I. Alexandrov which attacked Mao for "stubbornly trying to impose on the Chinese people the view of the USSR as China's enemy". The article went on to imply that Moscow would continue to hold out the prospect of improved Sino-Soviet relations to any reasonable Chinese leader who should succeed the Chairman.

It could be that the Soviets have tried actively to capitalize on the instability within the Chinese leadership by presenting some new proposal for settlement of the border issue, or in some other way maneuvering to crystallize the anti-Mao/Chiang Ching sentiment which has been so unprecedently visible in China over the past month. In this context, the explosion at the Soviet Embassy could be the work of those in the Chinese leadership who wish to forestall any possible movement toward Sino-Soviet political discussions and hope to sustain a high level of tension in the relationship.

US-PRC Relations: Continuity, but Criticism

Since the ouster of Teng Hsiao-p'ing, PRC authorities have gone to considerable length to communicate to us the view that there will be no shift in China's foreign policy as a result of the shake-up within the leadership. Comments by senior Chinese officials to foreign visitors, and briefing materials for NCNA correspondents and diplomatic personnel stationed abroad, stress this theme.

At the same time, Peking appears to have been pleased by a number of positive Presidential statements in early April stressing continuity in the US commitment to seek normalized relations with the PRC. The Hong Kong Wen Hui Pao, a PRC-owned newspaper, printed a commentary on April 16 entitled "Ford Attaches Importance to Sino-US Relations".



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Quoting from President Ford's statements of April 10, 13, and 14, the paper asserted that three positive Presidential comments on US-PRC relations three days in close succession was "something seldom heard before". The commentary concluded that, "Today, when so-called US-Soviet detente is cooling off and US-Soviet relations are gradually deteriorating, Ford's words and deeds concerning China are worthy of attention."

At the same time, on April 21 NCNA began a series of articles indirectly critical of the so-called "Sonnenfeldt Doctrine" as representing a US sell-out of Western Europe's security in the interest of preventing a Soviet-American confrontation over Europe. As well, on May 2 the PRC Liaison Office made a low-key representation to the State Department criticizing American naval aircraft surveillance of two Chinese hydrological ships which are conducting ocean surveys for the first time near the Fiji Islands.

Comment

Chairman Mao's prestige within China is probably at its lowest ebb since the failure of his Great Leap Forward agricultural experiment in the early 1960s. The present mood among Party cadre and the populace seems quite ugly. If Mao were to die shortly, and/or the senior leadership continues to tear itself apart in the succession struggle, we could very well see China return to the kind of domestic turmoil which was at its worst during the Cultural Revolution years of 1967 and 1968. One cannot rule out the possibility of military-backed coup attempts, or of a "de-Maoification" campaign after the Chairman dies (unless he can pull some major achievement out of his cap to rebuild his sagging prestige).

This situation holds two major points of concern for the US: First, it seems increasingly uncertain that after our fall elections we will be dealing with a government in Peking which has sufficient authority to be flexible and accommodating of our needs should we seek to complete the normalization process. Secondly, Moscow must be getting increasingly itchy as it watches the turmoil which is tearing apart China's elite. Thus far the Soviets appear to be responding to the situation by trying to play on the anti-Mao/Chiang Ching sentiment through propaganda measures, and perhaps by way of diplomatic ploys which we do not see. We should heighten our attention, however, to the possibility of the Russians playing more actively on the Chinese succession crisis, if not by military means then at least by more active political maneuvering.

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One would like to think that a PRC under heightened Soviet pressure might be more accommodating of our political needs regarding normalization if we tried to complete the process. It is increasingly uncertain, however, whether Mao's prestige will be behind whoever sits on the other side of the green baize table (if, indeed, Peking 1s able to field a negotiator with any authority); and our own public and the Congress may develop serious doubts that the U. S. should pay the price for normal relations with a China that is, once again, showing a penchant for periods of political chaos.

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
