



That is why it is vital that you send what you can today. Please send at least \$20 today. If you cannot send \$20, we will be grateful for whatever you can contribute. But we must have whatever your generous contribution by May 25.

It is important to consider what Ronald Reagan's defeat could mean for the Republican Party.





#### Behind the Reagan Surge

As President Ford assesses the astonishing reversal of his fortunes in Republican primaries, much of the Washington crowd is telling him that Ronald Reagan's convincing surge is due to his simplistic appeals to simplistic voters. We would put it another way, that Mr. Reagan has been adroitly exploiting those issues on which Mr. Ford's pragmatism has made him vulnerable.

It's not enough to say, as Senator Goldwater does, that you could put Jerry Ford and Ronald Reagan in the same dark room and not tell them apart by their political philosophies. For the President to reestablish himself with the voters, he must realize they are asking a further question: Which of the candidates is more likely to depart from conviction to appease the "political realities"? That is, to settle for X instead of the preferable Y if only because something is better than

The pragmatic habit appears most prominently in the Ford administration's conduct of foreign affairs, but then the Secretary of State and his whole department have a terminal case of the disease. When Mr. Kissinger's job was to extricate the United States from Vietnam, this pragmatic style was suited to the task. But Mr. Reagan senses that the public doesn't want continued retreat just because the alternative is said to be unrealistic.

A reasonable case can be made for renegotiating the Panama Canal treaty as an act of justice and magnanimity, for example, but the President's defenses of his position make it sound as if the United States is being forced to sign at the point of a gun. When he suggested that it has to be done because guerrilla warfare in the Canal Zone might occur otherwise, we could almost hear the votes falling into the Reagan column. Is our defense budget of \$115 billion insufficient to handle potential Panamanian guerrillas?

In the same way, Mr. Ford has permitted Mr. Kissinger to jump the gun in Africa. Because he fears a "bloodbath" in Rhodesia, he has committed the United States government to "relentless opposition" to the white minority regime in Salisbury. The policy includes strict economic sanctions against Rhodesia, which, in making both white and black Rhodesians poorer, would necessarily increase black economic unhappiness with white polit-

ical rule and thus add to chances of a bloodbath rather than slow but peaceful evolution.

The State Department has put together a veritable bouquet of silly policies to appease the ever-changing demands of the underdeveloped world. Treasury Secretary Simon valiantly fought the idea of going along with an international bureaucracy to somehow manage buffer commodity stocks. But at the White House, Mr. Kissinger won with his exhortation that concessions have to be made or the Third World will do bad things. Guerrilla warfare? Treasury also lost to State on the Law of the Sea, relative to the mining of the deep-sea mineral beds. So for the first time in history, the United States has offered to limit mineral production of U.S. companies to keep foreign mineral producers from being hurt by falling

Firing Mr. Kissinger wouldn't help, except if it reflected a change in the President's own disposition toward zealous pragmatism. Mr. Ford signed the energy bill, for example, not on Mr. Kissinger's advice, but on Frank Zarb's warning that while it wasn't a good bill, Congress would do bad things to the oil industry if it wasn't enacted. Then, too, depending upon the way the wind is blowing, Mr. Ford has endorsed and opposed the concept of national health insurance and endorsed and opposed the concept of a federalized welfare scheme.

This isn't to suggest that Mr. Ford lacks courage or decisiveness. Indeed, when there is not time to have a "position" tailored somewhere in the bureaucracy and a quick decision is required, Mr. Ford's instincts have been sound. And he has been relentless in vetoing spending bills that have cowed previous Presidents. This is the side of Jerry Ford his campaign ought to

But on a series of important issues, both foreign and domestic, he has appeared to be unnecessarily in retreat. He has seemed to give ground without a fight, to Congress, to the Soviets, to the Third World, when a firmer hand could have meant the holding of ground without a fight. Mr. Reagan has identified those weak points and is striking a responsive chord with the voters. Mr. Reagan understands, as perhaps Mr. Ford can as well, that the voters are looking for a fellow who doesn't negotiate with himself before he gets to the bargaining table.

# Reagan's 'work-or-else' welfare test rated a failure

By ROBERT E. SWEET United Press International

Former Gov. Ronald Reagan's "work-or-else" welfare experiment failed and had little impact on welfare or unemployment rates in the 35 counties where the program was tried, the State Employment Development Department said Monday.

In a formal evaluation, the department said the program, a key part of Reagan's

1971 welfare reform package, "did not prove to be administratively feasible and practical."

Instead of reducing welfare applications as expected, the number of applicants increased at a faster rate in the counties participating in the "Community Work Experience Program," the department said.

Although the program was designed to increase employment, unemployment was reduced by only 13.1 per cent in participating counties during the three year

project compared with a 21.7 per cent reduction in other California counties, the department said.

During the program's peak year of 1974, only 4,760 individuals, or 2.6 per cent, participated in program work assignments out of 182,735 persons available for assignment.

Because of the low percentage participation, the department said, the program probably had little impact on welfare and unemployment rolls.

Under the three-year project, which was discarded by the Brown administration June 30, 1975, an able-bodied welfare recipient was required to accept parttime work assignments in exchange for his benefit check — provided other avenues had been exhausted, such as job placement and training.

If he refused, he was to be removed from the welfare rolls.

Reagan officials expected the program would reduce the welfare rolls by forcing such persons to take jobs and by discour-

aging others from applying for public assistance if they could work.

But the department said the increase of applications from 1971 to 1974 in the Aid to Families with Dependent Children category was 7.5 per cent in counties taking part in the experiment compared with a 1.7 per cent rise in those not involved.

Asked about the timing of the report during the presidential campaign in which Reagan and Governor Brown are running for party nominations, one aide quipped, "It could have been worse (for Reagan).

It could have come just before the New Hampshire primary."

The department said statistical indicators "do not show that CWEP achieved any of its impact objectives."

The \$570,000 program was widely criticized when Reagan was in office by Democrats, who called it "slave labor." Brown asked the Legislature to let the program die when the federal grant expired last June 30, and the lawmakers complied.

## Parents Protest Hospitals Plan

SACRAMENTO (UPI) - Parents protesting the proposed closure of state hospitals for the mentally retarded today carried a promise from Gov. Ronald Reagan to "take a good hard look" before shutting down any of the facilities.

Led by actor Barry Sullivan, parent groups beseiged the state Capitol Thursday to oppose the Reagan administration's plan to get the state out of the business of providing "direct care" to the mentally retarded.

The administration is asking the legislature to approve a program to transfer mentally retarded patients to local care facilities by 1982.

Sullivan, whose mentally retarded son is a patient at Pacific State Hospital in Pomona, testified before a Senate subcommittee while pickets protested outside the Capitol. Later, he and other parents met with Reagan for almost two hours in the governor's office.

After the meeting, Sullivan reported Reagan "told us, in essence, all things will be held in abevance until a good hard look is taken.'

Edwin Gray, press secretary for Reagan, later said the group's report of what happened in the meeting was "in essence, correct.

Gray said Reagan told the parents that "if any transfers are to be made, they would only be made following the conclusion of an extensive hearing process, inventory of local facilities, establishment of standards and a thorough affected.'

Sullivan said "we don't know what is going to happen but we opened a line of communication that previously wasn't there" with Reagan, a former fellow film actor.

"The governor is not out to hurt mentally retarded children. We have to assume this," said Sullivan.

Earlier Thursday, Reagan defended plans to close state hospitals for both the mentally ill and retarded and declared some legislators are "try-ing to further their partisan goals" by confusing parents about the closures.

No one is being shoved out (of the hospitals) until counties are ready to take care of them" the gover-

input from all parties nor said in a question-andanswer session with a group of high school students.

> "No one is being turned out simply because we want to close a hospital."

Sullivan testified before the Health and Nutrition subcommittee, chaired by Sen. George Moscone, D-San Francisco, a 1974 gubernatorial contender, and contended local communities would be unable to provide adequate "understanding" for mentally retarded patients.

"We are living in a highly urbanized society,' Sullivan said before a packed hearing room. "We have a hard time outselves getting through a day, let's face it. To subject a defenseless child to this, well, I think it's uncivilized, almost inhumane."

State Mental Hygiene Director William Mayer told the subcommittee "those patients who are reated large, in ehumanized institutions re far better off in local acilities. The statement frew hisses from spectators.
