

MAILGRAM FROM GOVERNOR REAGAN TO ALL MEMBERS OF PLATFORM
COMMITTEE: SENT 8/5/76



Dear Platform Committee Member:

As a member of the Republican Party Platform Committee, you have a critical responsibility. The platform that is adopted by our National Convention in 1976 will serve as the basic set of principles on which our candidates, from President of the United States through numerous state and local offices, will run in this election year. Therefore, I would like to share with you a few thoughts concerning this platform.

The Democrats have now shown, by their choice of nominee and by their platform, where they stand on the issues. When you boil it down to essentials, they stand for more government control, higher taxes and less individual liberty.

In your deliberations, and in the Convention, the Republican Party will have an opportunity to make it clear that it offers a more progressive, more humane, more effective approach. We must put forth a platform that meets the challenge laid down by the Democrats. Our platform must be nothing less than a banner of bold, clear colors that will tell the American people how we, the Republican Party, would deal with the issues facing our country.

Our platform will necessarily cover many topics. I would like to highlight just a few that I feel should definitely be included:

The platform should call for a program that will insure that our national defense is number one in the world. Our foreign policy commitments, our military planning, and our fiscal support must assure that we can counter the trend toward Soviet superiority.

In the Middle East the United States should stand ready to



contribute to a just and durable peace. Such a peace must absolutely assure the continued security and survival of the State of Israel, with recognized boundaries accepted by all parties. At the same time, it must respect the legitimate needs and rights of the Palestinian Arabs.

The platform should call for a program to insure that inflation is finally brought under control and that millions of well paying jobs are created by our private economy. The federal government, with its deficits and controls, has been the primary cause of our present economic turmoil. The platform should reaffirm those Republican principles that will lead our nation to long-range fiscal stability and improved economic opportunity for all our citizens.

The platform should call for strong measures by the federal government to support state and local law enforcement agencies in their job of controlling crime. We must guard our borders against the inflow of narcotics and dangerous drugs and must effectively combat interstate criminal activities.



Our platform must also show the families of America where we stand on those issues that most affect their daily lives.

We have seen too much of governmental actions that work against, rather than strengthen, family life--governmental actions which not only harm the family, but also destroy the sense of neighborhood and community that is vital to our society. Forced school busing is such an action. It is so obviously wrong that the great majority of Americans, black and white, are against it. Yet, courts continue to impose it.

Parents have a right and responsibility to direct the education of their children, including the choice of their children's school. Our platform should make it clear that we are committed to work for legislation--in keeping with the 14th Amendment--to end forced busing. And, if that should prove inadequate, our party's commitment should extend to a Constitutional Amendment which declares that no state or the federal government shall refuse admission to a public educational institution to any person, otherwise qualified, solely on the basis of race, color, ethnic origin, sex, or creed.

School prayer is a major important family issue. Children

should be permitted to take part in non-denominational prayer in school if that is the wish of the parents of that community. Our platform should recognize this right of local choice.

In the field of gun control, we should recognize that there is just one kind of gun law that will act as a deterrent to crime. That is mandatory and longer prison sentences of those convicted of crimes with guns in their possession.

In preserving the family, we must recognize once and for all, that to perform an abortion is to take a human life, and that such an act can be condoned only if the life of the mother is in danger. And let us also make it clear that our party believes that the federal government has no business whatever underwriting abortions.

Our platform should call for welfare reform--reform that includes ending welfare abuse and relieving the overburdened taxpayer from supporting able bodied persons who are capable of working and becoming contributing members of society. Our platform should spell out clearly our Party's opposition to guaranteed annual income schemes and "federalization" of welfare.

Finally, our platform should call for a change in the size, course, and scope of the federal government. We must decrease the cost and the power of a swollen, insensitive bureaucracy, and in doing so we will not only protect our citizens against higher taxes but also against the continual loss of freedom that inevitably flows from a larger, more powerful centralized national government.

If our platform speaks out clearly on these and other important issues, all of our candidates will have a firm base on which they can present themselves to the voters this November. As a party of principles that enhance human dignity, individual freedom, and family responsibility, we will provide an effective alternative to our opponents--a party which represents the mainstream thinking of the American people.

SUGGESTED STANDING RULES OF THE
COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTION (PLATFORM)

1. The Committee shall elect a chairman by a majority vote of the membership.
2. The chairman shall be empowered to appoint and supervise additional officers and staff necessary to carry out the duties and functions of the Committee.
3. The chairman shall be empowered to designate subcommittees to carry on the work of the Committee, and to appoint chairmen, co-chairmen and members to serve on each. At any meeting of the Committee or subcommittee, in the absence of the chairman, the co-chairman or a member designated by the chairman shall preside.
4. The chairman may sit as an ex-officio member of the sub-committees, but shall not vote in the subcommittees nor be counted for the purpose of assisting in the establishment of a quorum.
5. A majority of the Committee, and of each of its subcommittees, shall constitute a quorum for the purpose of conducting business.
5. After a motion has been made or an amendment has been offered, each speaker will be limited to 5 minutes.



7. All amendments shall be submitted in writing, in advance of being offered, to the reading clerk of the Committee. Amendments may be offered immediately after the reading of a motion or a resolution by the reading clerk.


8. Motions to limit or to close debate have precedence over other motions, are not debatable, cannot be amended, and require for adoption a majority vote of members present. After a motion to limit ~~or close debate~~ has been approved, time for debate will be equally divided between those in favor and those opposed. *After a motion to close has been approved, the proponents & opponents on the issue in question shall be allotted 5 minutes each.*
9. The Standing Rules may be suspended, for a definite purpose only, in part or in whole, by a 2/3 vote of the membership. Such a motion is not debatable, cannot be amended, and takes precedence over all motions except motions to limit or close debate.

The rules contained in Robert's Rules of Order shall govern the Committee and its subcommittees in all cases to which they are applicable and in which they are not inconsistent with the Standing Rules of the Committee.

RE: Appointment of Convention Officers and Committee Chairmen

I spoke today with Jo Good at the Republican National Committee, who advised me as to the procedures followed by the RNC in the appointment of officers to the National Convention and the election of the Chairmen to the four standing Committees to the National Convention.

First, with regard to the election of the temporary officers to the Convention, Ms. Good advised me that the Arrangements Committee will select temporary convention officers on June 21, 1976 at the RNC meeting in Washington, D. C. The officers would include both the temporary and permanent Chairman, Secretary, Parliamentarian, Assistant Parliamentarian, Chief of Staff and 5 assistants, Chief Sergeant-at-Arms and 4 or 5 assistants, Chief Reading Clerk and an assistant, and several Table Clerks. In addition, several Chaplains will be chosen by the Arrangements Committee but are not elected to such posts. Those elected to such temporary posts will be proposed by the Arrangements Committee, along with a keynote speaker by formal nomination, to the National Committee on the following day, June 25. Upon the approval of such officers and keynote speaker by the National Committee, with the exception of the temporary Chairman, the names of those persons will be forwarded to the Committee on Permanent Organizations, who normally ratify the nomination of such persons in a report to the Convention in August. The sole exception to this process is the approval and election of the Temporary Chairmen who must be formally elected by the entire body of Convention delegates. Other nominations for temporary Chairmen may be made at the time such nominations are placed before the entire Convention. Ms. Good noted that although the Committee on Permanent Organizations normally consists of "rubberstamp" approvals of the RNC's recommendation, they are nonetheless not bound by these recommendations.



Second, with regard to the four standing committees at the National Convention (i.e., Credentials, Rules, Resolution and Platform and Permanent Organizations) that the members of such committees consist of one male and one female delegate from each State delegation who has been selected to serve on that particular committee. Delegates may serve on only one such committee. At the same time, within a week or so prior to the National Convention in August, delegates appointed to such committees by their State delegation meet and select a Chairman from their number. It is important to note that unless our desired Chairmen are both elected as delegates to the National Convention and are selected by the State delegation to serve on such National Committees, they would not qualify for such a position.

COMMITTEES OF THE REPUBLICAN NATIONAL CONVENTION

There are four committees of the National Convention. They are as follows

1. Committee on Credentials
2. Committee on Resolutions (Platform)
3. Committee on Rules and Order of Business
4. Committee on Permanent Organization

MEMBERSHIP

In accordance with Rule No. 14(a) adopted by the 1972 Republican National Convention, each State, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, the Virgin Islands and Guam is entitled to one man Delegate and one woman Delegate on each of these four committees.

A man Delegate cannot serve in lieu of a woman Delegate. Alternate Delegates may not serve as members of the Convention Committees.

No Delegate may serve on more than one committee of the National Convention.

If a delegation has no women Delegates, only one man Delegate may be appointed on each of the Convention Committees.

If a delegation is so small that it is impossible to have a man Delegate and a woman Delegate on all Convention Committees, the State, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, the Virgin Islands and Guam may distribute the appointments in any manner they desire -- one Delegate on each Committee or two on one Committee (if man and woman) and one on another, etc.

FUNCTIONS

COMMITTEE ON CREDENTIALS

The purpose of this Committee is to receive the credentials of all of the Delegates and Alternates from the Secretary of the Republican National Committee and determine the Permanent Roll of the Convention. If there is any question concerning the proper certification of a Delegate or Alternate, it should be submitted to this Committee. The members of the Credentials Committee may sit in on all hearings of contests before the National Committee and will be notified of such a meeting. If a contest exists, it must be decided by the Republican National Committee in making up the Temporary Roll of the Convention. The National Committee meets several days to a week before the National Convention to decide all contests.

The first meeting of the Committee on Credentials will probably be held on Monday, August 16, 1976, after the first session of the Convention and continue meeting after the first session until the work of the Committee is completed. A notice of the meeting will be sent to each member indicating the hour and place.

COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS (PLATFORM)

The purpose of this Committee is to draft the Platform of the Republican Party for the next four years.

A few months prior to the Convention the Chairman of the Republican National Committee appoints a Temporary Committee on Resolutions. This is done because a great deal of the work of this Committee must be started long in advance of the Convention. Considerable research is required, hearings must be arranged and drafts prepared for consideration of the Committee.

As soon as each State selects the Delegates who are to serve on the Committee on Resolutions, the Secretary of the Republican National Committee will notify the Temporary Platform Chairman in order that information can be sent to them and to learn of their areas of interest and expertise.

The Resolutions Committee may be divided into subcommittees concerned with specific issues.

The Platform Committee will hold an organizational meeting a full week before the Convention starts (Sunday, August 8, 1976) and hold hearings during that week. It is important for the Delegates appointed to this Committee to arrive in the Convention City a week earlier than the other Delegates.

COMMITTEE ON RULES AND ORDER OF BUSINESS

The purpose of this Committee is to draft the Rules to be adopted by the Convention to determine the proceedings in the Convention, the organization of the National Committee and the membership in the next National Convention. The Committee will review the Rules as they presently exist and will consider the recommendations made by the Committee on Rules of the National Committee.

The first meeting of the Committee on Rules and Order of Business may be held a few days before the Convention starts. The Committee will continue meeting after the first session until the work of the Committee is completed.

COMMITTEE ON PERMANENT ORGANIZATION

The business of this Committee is to act upon the recommendations made by the National Committee concerning the Officers of the Convention. The Committee usually meets on the first day of the Convention after the morning session. One session is sufficient to complete the work of this Committee.







THE GOP PLATFORM PROCESS

KANSAS CITY-- The process of preparing the platform which will be placed before the Republican National Convention next week began during June with public regional hearings in Washington, Los Angeles and Ames, Iowa, under the chairmanship of Governor Robert D. Ray of Iowa.

"Gaining a hearing before the Platform Committee was as easy as making the request," Ray said. "The Committee's policy has been to accommodate every group or individual who has requested an opportunity to testify on an issue under consideration by the Committee."

At the same time, Platform Committee staff and the GOP researchers began to assemble background on issues under consideration for use in the final document.

Ray stressed his desire that the "Committee consider as many diverse viewpoints as possible during the early platform hearings."

On Sunday, the full 106-member Committee assembles for the first time. Assignments to the seven working subcommittees will be confirmed. Final public hearings will be held before the full Committee and in subcommittee sessions. The full Committee will meet on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday mornings with subcommittee sessions scheduled for Monday and Tuesday afternoons.

Once the hearing process is completed, the formal drafting process begins at the subcommittee level, Ray explained.

Utilizing opinions and information from all hearings and a series of "working papers" prepared at the staff level, the Committee members will consider proposed wording for platform planks in meetings of the subcommittees and the full Committee, he said.

At an organizational meeting of the Executive Committee in Washington, D.C. earlier this month, Ray suggested three guidelines for the 1976 GOP Platform. They were: simplicity, intimacy and brevity. He also told the subcommittee Chairmen and Co-Chairmen that he hoped this year's document would have a continuity and style that would make it "interesting and appealing to all Americans who support the Republican Party."

The Committee's Platform document will be presented to the Convention on Tuesday, August 17.

During the Convention, rules of the U.S. House of Representatives will govern discussion of the draft document.
