

Sterling Cole

In reference to Sterling Cole, I have talked with him on the matter involving the defense issue as well as the Ambassadorial post.

Mike Samuels, with Secretary Rush, has called to indicate the special emphasis being placed on this appointment by Ken Rush.

I have reason to feel that there may be some problem in the White House personnel office. They advise me that Cole had been offered other lesser Ambassadorial posts inasmuch as Austria is not open. However, Cole tells me that there has been no such offer.

I think there is no question that Ken Rush is making a determined and sincere effort on Cole's behalf. I think continued pressure on the personnel office is necessary.
