- <u>Barry Goldwater</u> has written and talked with me about the President beginning a 1970's version of the old FDR fireside chats. A copy of his letter is attached.
- 2. <u>Mail.</u> There still seems to be a question as to what mail is and can be sent directly to us for answer, with the appropriate lead in, "Your letter has been sent to us....". It seems to me that all mail, including contributions, volunteers, etc., could automatically be picked up by the courier. This would include mail being handled by the White House Correspondence Section.
- 3. John Tower would like to be Chairman of the Platform Com-
- 4. <u>Max Fisher</u>. Per Max Fisher, the President has asked him V^Q to be on the Advisory Committee which Dean then confirmed in writing. This is obviously fine with me if this is what the President wants. However, we need to get this information from you or from the President, not from the individual.
- 5. I received a letter from State Assemblyman Paul T. Bannai in California requesting that the President write a congratulatory letter to the Sports Nippon press in Tokyo relative to their sponsoring a college all-star football game in Tokyo next January. He apparently was told by the White House that it is not the policy of the President to write such letters.

Since I am sure we will be getting many similar requests during the campaign, could you let me know the reasons behind this.

FOR DICK CHENEY "TFIS-AND THAT"

6. <u>MISSISSIPPI</u>. Bud Meredith, head of the American Apparel Manufacturers Association, and a good supporter of the President, has asked if President Ford would take part in a fund raiser in Washington for Gil Carmichael who is running for Governor in Mississippi. Carmichael ran against Eastland previously and got 40% of the vote.

I told Bud I thought that there was little likelihood of this. If I have misread the President and he would be interested in this, I am to get back in touch with Bud.

It's just my feeling that the President would not want to incur the enmity of Eastland and Stennis unnecessarily at this time when a fund raiser in Washington would not be that important for a Mississippi gubernatorial candidate anyway.

Incidentally, Carmichael is given a chance of winning and has the idea of naming himself as Senator (which he can do in Mississippi without consent of the legislature) in the event there is a vacancy during his term as Governor.

- 7. Bill Clifford, Executive Director of the American Water Ski Association, has written a letter to the President. As a former President of the Water Ski Association, I have stayed close to this board and that's the reason for my getting involved. These are high class young people and worthy of cur support. As you can see from his letter, he is asking the President to greet them when they pass through Washington. I'm not sure it's appropriate, but if it fits within the policy, I do think it would be at least appropriate to send a letter of congratulations. I can easily deliver it to them when they pass through town or handle it in any way that seems appropriate.
- 8. Senator Eob Stephens, Minority Leader in California, indicates that he thinks it's important for the White House to have a liaison with state legislators. What he wants is a person for contact, who should have the affirmative duty of legislative coordination and liaison. He should be working for such things as a White House conference on legislative leaders. Stephens apparently sent a resolution from California to the White House, but never got a response. He has asked for me to support this and let him know what I found out.
- 9. I am enclosing a letter from Ben Kline which I think has merit. It's appealing to me -- "Gerald Ford, the Affordable Candidate."

Give this your consideration. No one has done it since Roosevelt's time and it's needed.



SUBJECT: Letters for Signature

Per our conversation and your request, I have outlined below my recommendations for letters which should be prepared for your signature:

- The policy should be fairly liberal in the area of PFC Chairmen, Finance Chairmen and key Committee workers in each State.
- (2) We believe that letters should be confined at this time to workers and not contributors, with the possible exception noted below. Emphasis should be on the people who give their volunteer time to get results both in the fund-raising and political areas.

However, Dave Packard would like letters to go to the first 1,000 people who have contributed, which will include a cross section of contributors from a \$1.00 to \$1,000 contributor. This is acceptable to me if you agree.

- (3) Names should be submitted by the Chairmen in each State and coordinated through our office for submission to the White House. This should continue throughout the campaign, and sufficient background on the individual should be included.
- (4) At present, such a list would include the "California 44", selected individuals from the North Carolina group, and all Finance Chairmen who have accepted this responsibility.
- (5) I believe it is important that all letters over your signature are "special". If too many people, for any reason, receive a letter, it will lessen the significance and impact of the thank you.
- (6) We will prepare all letters for your signature so no questions can be raised concerning expenditures. Basic drafts for your signature will be submitted to your office for approval.

Please let me know your decision on this.





Dear Don:

As a short follow-up to our conversation of today and as an introduction to our talents, Reynard Press is the in-house agency for the various divisions of Warner Electric Company. Our entire marketing and sales program is through print media and direct mail and though over the years we have tested broadcast media we have always found that print media, and most especially direct mail, has been our most fruitful area.

It is difficult to set down a complete direct mail-marketing campaign in a few lines but historically both Mr. George Wallace and Mr. Richard Nixon profited greatly from a direct mail campaign using the more rudimentary demographic procedures. Here we have our own IBM 360 and in our market testing we are able to zero in on certain areas exactly as a company commander zeroes in on an enemy front. We use a test mailing for the probe and if this proves successful we then throw an entire campaign into that market. This entire probe campaign procedure is analyzed for us on our computer and these programs are our own which we have devised over the years.

In any direct mail campaign it is most important to understand that it must not only be self-liquidating, it must also be profitable. The initial monies for a direct mail campaign can be substantial, but the return is almost immediate.

Don, I believe strongly in this area as regards a Presidential campaign for a myriad of reasons, the first being that you can create any image you wish and flatter your candidate by stressing his positive points in print, whereas in broadcast media there is no room for imagination because of the graphics involved.

Again, in print media the message is substantiated by having the letter lie on the recipient's desk or bureau so it can be read and reread and handled and re-handled. Also, the broadcast media message is immediately erased by a commercial or succeeding program.

The key in direct mail marketing is the talent and the energy behind it. I am quite surprised that the President has not elected this form of marketing for himself and his administration since Mr. Nixon's record of his organization (CREEP) was so successful. Quite frankly, I do not know if there is enough time to accomplish the successful campaign which should be done if you elect to go this route. It will take twelve hours a day, seven days a week. Testing is a luxury we will not be able to afford timewise. It must be handled with experience and talent.

The President of the United States of America is running for re-election and the average man in the street has absolutely no idea why he should vote for this man. As horrible as this may read, this is a fact of life. We must reach this man in print in his home and explain why Mr. Ford represents the fulfillment of American ideals and personification of the American dream.

I was a founder of the Free Business School which is basically a black organization to aid the under-privileged in assuming responsibilities of management. My subject matter was The Success and Failure Factors and in my opening lecture I would always ask my students what is the single factor we cannot measure on an I.Q. test. Usually I was not disappointed. There was always one student who came up with the proper answer: drive!

The election can be won with the proper energy channelled into a spearhead marketing campaign for this magnificent product which you have the honor to represent.

Since I have handled the re-election campaign of a Congressman of many years standing, as well as Youth for Kennelly prior to Mr. Daley's taking office, I do believe I have some feel for political engineering and marketing. Upon Mr. Ford's receiving the nomination to again head the party, I would be honored if you would call upon me to contribute my services on a volunteer basis, or earlier if you so desire.
