came President of the Aero Club of America. He was a prominent of Augustus St. Gaudens. The publisher, patriot, sportsman, symbolism is-The Genius of and aviator and the first person to purchase an airplane from the Wright Brothers for personal use. He believed that the Club should take a stand against what he called, "the useless and reckless exhibition of flying that had cost America so many priceless lives."
