Dear Mr. President:

On behalf of the Governors of the States I want to assure you that our hopes and prayers as well as those of all Americans go out to you as you assume the awesome responsibilities of the Presidency. You may depend on our fullest cooperation and assistance in the trying days ahead as you begin the task of binding up the wounds of the Nation and restoring the promise of America.

It is to you that the people of this Nation will look to reunite the country and to fulfill the promise to "bring us together." You will be severely tested, but listening to your remarks following the oath of office I know you will succeed. I felt I was witnessing the beginning of a new era.

No doubt you have already begun the process of sorting out potential candidates for the Vice Presidency. Although it must be an early decision it obviously will be considered most carefully. Recent history has taught us that few decisions a President may make are as important as the selection of the Vice President. Not only must Governors formulate overall policies and legislative programs to address these problems but they must then implement and manage that legislation and those policies. That combination of legislative and executive experience tested in the political arena could provide invaluable counsel to you as your administration begins its initiatives and evolves its programs.

My Dear Mr. President:

I deeply appreciate your invitation, transmitted by Chairman Bush, to suggest to you names of persons whom you might consider in selecting your nominee for Vice President of the United States.

To observe that your choice as nominee for Vice President is a crucially important decision would only labor the obvious. It is clearly in the national interest that the reestablishment of the faith of the people in their government begun by your accession to the Presidency, would be best assured by your choice as Vice President of a man of impeccable honesty, unquestioned integrity, deep compassion, proven ability and acknowledged gualities of mind and heart which command the respect of all citizens both in and out of government as well as throughout the world. He should be a man who will work with you and for you to help you achieve the goals you outlined so eloquently and feelingly in your address to the Congress, the nation and the world last night.

Such a man, uniquely is Nelson Rockefeller.

Since you are aware of his record of achievement in both international and domestic concerns in the Eisenhower, Truman and Roosevelt administrations, there is no need for me to mention these assets, except to suggest that although he is and has always been a proud and unshakeable Republican, he has, in these undertakings, demonstrated the capacity to work cooperatively with men and women of other parties in the broad national interest. Your choice of him then would, in my opinion, be a further manifestation that your Administration will be one of and for all the people, including the huge majority of our fellow citizens who are not numbered in Republican ranks.

For fifteen years as Lieutenant Governor I worked on an intimate day-by-day basis with Governor Rockefeller in the executive branch of government in this State with its immensely complex problems. What impressed me, among other things was that while he was the Chief Executive, he was a total "team player" -- and both solicited and respected the views of others in the formulation and execution of policy, -- never allowing pride of his own opinion to blind him to the counsel and judgment of those who worked with him, including me, in arriving at decisions. He fully understands the essentiality of loyalty and respect for lines of authority. Such a Vice President would be of tremendous help to you.

Difficult though it be in view of my deep affection for Nelson Rockefeller, I have endeavored to put aside subjective considerations and make this an objective assessment, -- because yours is a herculean task, -- because I am above all an American, and because I want you to have the very best talent available to assist you as our future is in your capable hands.

Although I am convinced that Nelson Rockefeller is head and shoulders ahead of any others of whom I can think, because Chairman Bush said you wished the suggestion of three possible nominees, I would say that Governor Daniel Evans of Washington would be my second choice, with Chairman Bush himself my third choice although, frankly, your nomination of the national party chairman, -- despite his congressional experience and acknowledged probity, might well be seized upon by critics, -- albeit unwarrantedly, as being based on partisanship rather than ability.

Thank you very much for allowing me the privilege of making these suggestions. Whatever your decision, you will have my full support.
