. Asks that he receive Administration input on pending bills on silver, lead and tin so that his Subcommittee can call hearings on the legislation and be responsive to the November 18 call from the President for action on the legislation.

As a friend, offers "gratuitous advice" on handling of the Presidency with respect to relations with Republicans in Congress, who, he says, were elected without relevancy to Party label. General thrust of the letter is to urge close consultation with elected GOP leadership, particularly with respect to vetos; diligent attention to domestic affairs and to put his stamp on the Administration by making a visible break with personnel of the Nixon Administration.

State that the Department of Housing & Urban Development, in implementing the Emergency Home Purchase Assistance Act of 1974, are circumventing the aims of Congress and the result is excessive and needless charges to the homebuyer and the builder. Cite the Oct. 22 regulations setting the interest rate at 8 1/2% and providing for the charging of up to 6 1/2 points additionally to be paid by the homebuyer and the builder, resulting in a yield on the mortgage of close to 9 1/2%. State that HUD is doing by administrative fiat what the Congress said it should not.
