Pope Paul's Message for 1975 "Day of Peace"

The Apostolic Delegate to the United States has forwarded the text of Pope Paul's message, "Reconciliation -- The Way to Peace," commemorating the Church's "Day of Peace" which will be celebrated on January 1, 1975 (Tab A).

The central points of the message are as follows:

- -- The history of mankind, through a sort of evolutionary process, is moving toward peace, toward unity. Paradoxically, however, there are forces at work that seek to divide men -- nationalism; poverty and hunger; the unchecked spread of destructive weapons.
 - -- Peace is "made" through a conscious effort on the part of mankind.
- -- Men must be "unceasingly educated in the discipline of order for the common good and in the ideal of Peace."
 - -- Only Peace generates Peace.
 - -- Minds must be disarmed if the recourse to arms is to be halted.
- -- Man must make use of and apply the spiritual element which is already present and at work in the world in order to bring about a reconciliation among men.
- -- Peace cannot be imposed; Peace must be based on a reconciliation of hearts, a reconciliation with God.
