EDUCATION RUSSIAN STYLE

Dick Kennedy introduced SANDRA and WENDELL HILL, presenting their observations and color slides of the Russian school system from the point of view of an American school superintendent. The Russians have made progress even in the last year in their appearance, dress, and accomodation of visitors. The largest hotel in the world is under construction.

The secondary schools, kindergarten through age 17, are efficient. Equipment and architecture appear twenty-five years behind this country. Their emphasis on the arts, ballet, and music, seem to exceed U.S. performance, but Wendell didn't show us any big bands.

The Russian nursery schools, operating from 7 a.m. until 8 p.m. as well as providing full time boarding facilities for the homeless, have no counterpart in this country. The pictures presented happy, well dressed, well supervised children starting at age 2, a solid foundation for the collective society.

At age 17, children graduate to the technical schools or universities, all depending on their aptitude testing, and superintendent Hill noted very little difference from the direction of the U.S. pattern. He advised that the big difference was the objective of the system. The Russians are trained to take their part in a collective society. There, freedom in the American sense is an obscenity, contrasted to our individual achievement and individual decision making educational goals.

The Russians have great faith in their future and great pride in their recent achievements. There seems to be a place for five year plans which contrasts remarkably with the current U.S. situation.

The meeting was conducted by CHRIS SONNEVELDT, song leader JACK COLLINS and the Invocation by REV. MAURICE FETTY. TED HIBBARD was at the piano. Welcome back, Ted.




