In this connection, we are inviting the Governor of Massachusetts, the two United States Senators, the local Congressman, and local State officials, who I am sure would expect to be included if there is to be a private group. If the President prefers, any other arrangements can be made for his luncheon that he desires. We have assumed that he would not want to be on the stage in the Auditorium with us during the Masonic ceremony. Although we would love to have him if he would so wish. Our suggestion would be that he rest in quarters that will be provided for him during that ceremony and will be escorted on the stage from the wings at its conclusion. However, all this is completely flexible and we will adopt whatever procedure he and his Staff desire.

We are hopeful that you and Mrs. Goodling will be our guests on this occasion. We have reserved a block of rooms at the Howard Johnson "57" downtown motel and one will be made available to you.

I would appreciate it if you would get the enclosed copy of the Dedication Ceremony, the Brochure, and a copy of this letter which we enclose for that purpose in the hands of the appropriate official on the President's Staff.
