Dear Mr. President:

In 1969, when you were in the House, you supported a move to have the Seaway Development Corporation headquarters moved to Cleveland. Since that time a Washington office has been established and, like most things, has grown like Topsy. As part of your effort to make the Federal Government more responsive to the needs of regions like the Great Lakes, the Corporation office should be <u>in the Great Lakes</u>. We have \$275,000,000 in our bond issue for ports and waterways development. After five years the Maritime Administration finally opened a Great Lakes office in Cleveland. The Seaway Corporation's move should be next. Without a twelve-month Great Lakes-St. Lawrence Seaway transportation system, the United States' share of world trade will continue to decline.

One way to eliminate the fragmentation and proliferation of Federal agencies is the creation of a Great Lakes Regional Commission. The Great Lakes' region has suffered over the years because it lacked an overall method for funding its regional needs. HR 4073 should be amended to permit an organized, efficient way of funding through a Great Lakes' Regional Commission.

If this course is followed, all other regional entities should be abolished with the new Regional Commission assuming the functions, with a headquarters in the Great Lakes. Having the present Regional Commissions headquartered in Washington never did make sense to me. The provisions for both energy and transportation development in HR 4073 also makes sense to me. Since Vice President Rockefeller is wrestling with the 27-billion-dollar Federal Research and Development budget, I would suggest that the Regional Commission approach be considered as a vehicle for funding research and development since most regions have need for specialized technologies.

We would be glad to assist in expediting these concepts.

Dear Mr. President:

According to my reports, the U. S. Department of Transportation has transmitted its Fiscal Year 1977 budget request to your office of Management and Budget. It is my further understanding that hearings on the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration's budget will be held on October 23, 1975.

My concern about the N.H.T.S.A. budget is whether or not it includes the National Compliance Test Facility for Ohio that I talked with you about in July. As you know, we have been waiting since 1972 for approval of this project. Your support is urgently requested so construction can begin in 1977.

One other item of extreme importance to us and, we think, the Nation, is passage of our Transportation Bond Issue in November. Our cause could be helped by having Secretary Coleman visit our Transportation Center to announce the location of N.H.T.S.A.'s Engineering Facility. The lease between Ohio and the Federal Government is ready to sign. We could use his visit (which should be prior to the election, Tuesday, November 4, 1975) to have Secretary Coleman urge passage of this "forward looking" transportation issue. The announcement that you are going to include the Compliance Test Facility in your Fiscal Year 1977 budget would also help.

An early date for Secretary Coleman's visit is essential.
