I. PURPOSE

To address approximately 260 Presidential spokesmen and appointees and representatives from 25 agencies and offices throughout the government.

BACKGROUND, PARTICIPANTS, PRESS PLAN

A. Background: This is the first briefing of all Presidential appointees and spokesmen held since right after the State of the Union, a meeting in which you participated on January 21 along with the Vice President, Jim Cannon, Paul O'Neill and Alan Greenspan. Other meetings of this type in which you have participated were held on April 15, 1975, where you and Secretary Kissinger briefed on foreign affairs; January 16, 1975, on the State of the Union and your first meeting on August 13, 1974, right after taking office to meet with appointees.

There will be a broad representation of your Administration including Cabinet Secretaries, Assistant Secretaries, heads of agencies and Cabinet Secretaries' staffs. Presentations will be made on the economy, the budget, defense policy and foreign affairs.

- B. Participants: In addition to the approximately 260 representatives of 25 agencies, the program includes Alan Greenspan, James T. Lynn, Donald H. Rumsfeld and Henry Kissinger.
- C. Press Plan: David Hume Kennerly photos only. There will be no press coverage.
