These notes stretch many months, showing that in early July I was told clearly that the cable had been sent to the Bahamian Prime Minister for approval, and then on three other specific occasions I was lied to. I will swear to the accuracy of these memorandum notes that show that my appointment could have been sent to the Senate as early as mid-July. It didn't get there until October 1st, the night preceding adjournment.

My sincere appreciation for your welcome call, and for your consideration of the merits of this matter.

TRANSCRIPTION FROM 1976 HANDWRITTEN DAY BOOK:

March 11th: Letter from Ody re Iceland possibilities.

March 25th: Call from White House concerning Ambassadorship to Iceland.

- May 3rd: Trip to Washington and discussion at White House about problems involving Iceland, and inquiry as to my interest in the Bahamas.
- June Call from Ody including congratulations by Bob Knowles following confirmation from President to Ody that I had been selected for the post of Ambassador to the Bahamas.
- June 28th: FBI and IRS begin investigation, to be completed by July 6th.

 Medical exams completed and returned to State Department July 5th.
- June 29th: Appointments at State Department with Charles Robinson, Deputy Secretary of State; Lawrence S. Eagleburger, Deputy Under Secretary of State for Management. Eagleburger remarked during our discussion that everything had been cleared with Secretary of State Kissinger, and that it would only take a few days for clearance from the Bahamas.
- July 12th: Bob Off, Special Assistant to the Deputy Under Secretary for Management (Dept. of State) informed me that the cable had been sent to Prime Minister Pindling of Bahamas (through Embassy in Nassau) for approval. A week to ten days would be ordinary clearance time, he informed me, but it could come back in a matter of a couple of days, as Secretary Eagleburger had remarked. Two weeks later, when no word had been heard, Bob Off informed me that a back-up cable had been sent to determine why approval had not been received as yet.
- July 22nd: Jim Field called at 10:15 AM, and said that everything was clear, and that I would be up for Senate hearing by the August 2nd deadline. No security or other problems had arisen, and the rest was just routine handling of an ambassadorial appointment. He said, in response to my inquiry, that "security" was an umbrella term used by the State Department for over all preparation for confirmation hearings. He concluded by saying that the White House was very aware of deadlines, and that he had checked my papers and everything was in order and okay.
- August 7th: Talked with Ody concerning delay on confirmation, and he said that he was going to be talking to Dick Cheney at the White House about two or three key matters, and that he would discuss this nomination also.

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

to the Bahamas

In the past few days we have become aware of a very sensitive situation regarding Internal Revenue Service activities in the Bahamas and potential adverse ramifications both internationally and domestically if the incumbent Ambassador Weiss is replaced by Jack Olson of Wisconsin. You had approved and we were completing the processing of Olson to assume the post when this situation surfaced.

In the mid-60's the IRS investigated allegations of tax evasion in the Bahamas. Although the local government was to some degree aware of these IRS investigations, there apparently was some free wheeling to include the use of paid informants without the consent of local authorities. Last year there was a grand jury investigation to examine the methods used by the IRS with the result that in April of this year we advised the Bahamian government that all such activities had been discontinued. There was an allegation in the Los Angeles Times in late May that Prime Minister Pindling had taken a \$100,000 bribe from a U.S. firm and included in this story was a rehash of the previously discontinued IRS activities. There is no evidence to date that Pindling actually received such payment.

In the past few days the State Department learned that contrary to the April communication to the Bahamian government, the Justice Department has continued to use the services of a woman in the Bahamas considered to be an informant (she was an IRS informant, but now seems to be doing research in public documents for the Justice Department).

Sees appartment

The CBS program, "60 Minutes" intends to run a story probably in early September charging continued IRS activities in the Bahamas as well as the previous charges against the IRS.

Larry Eagleberger has described two potential problems which could arise if Weiss is removed at this time:

- 1) In terms of foreign policy, the withdrawal of Weiss, on the heels of a "revelation" that the IRS still has an agent in the Bahamas, could have serious consequences on the attitude of Prime Minister Pindling. Weiss personally assured the Prime Minister that the IRS had ceased any such practice, and Weiss' removal now could easily be seen by Pindling as evidence that Weiss had lied to him and that the Executive Branch was itself deeply involved in the activities in the Bahamas. This could be bad for the U.S. in terms of our general relationships with the Bahamas in any event, but could be extremely serious since we are now seeking to renegotiate our bases agreement with the Bahamas.
- 2) In domestic political terms we need to be concerned about how "60 Minutes" and political commentators would read the Weiss withdrawal. While this is not something that can be fully judged from the State Department, it does seem to us that there is a substantial potential danger that commentators would use the Weiss withdrawal as evidence that the United States government is (was) deeply and illegally involved in the Bahamas and that this Administration is trying to cover up or lay the blame on the Ambassador.

Dick Cheney can describe to you the commitment made to Olson and Ody Fish respecting the Olson appointment. If you decide that it would be unwise to remove Weiss there are two alternatives: possibly nominating Olson to another country, perhaps Paraguay (I will have to check this with the State Department) or, after the dust is settled in a few months and after the election, we could assure Olson that he would be nominated to the Bahamas post. Of course, the delicacy of this situation would have to be explained to Olson.
