

The saddest song a band can play today is "Happy Days Are Here Again." Are you happy with what is happening to our country?

Are you happy that America is bogged down in a no-win war which has taken the lives of more than 32,700 of our young men?

Are you happy that our land is torn by lack of respect for law and order and a lack of respect for the rights of others?

Are you happy that the national crime rate has gone up 89 per cent since 1960, nearly nine times faster than the population?

Are you happy that the cost of living is climbing faster than at any other time since the Korean War?

Are you happy that the Johnson-Humphrey Administration has run the Treasury deep in the hole, so that just the interest on the federal debt costs us more than \$15 billion a year?

Are you happy that the Johnson-Humphrey Administration's fiscal mismanagement has brought us higher federal income taxes this year?

No, of course you're not. And all across this country the cry is going up that it's time for a change.

Now, how do you change Washington policies? You don't change them by passing the power on to the No. 2 Guy in the White House, the man who has been part and parcel of all the bad decision-making and the reckless spending that have plunged us into a mess.

The way to change policies is to change the men at the top.


