Your meeting with Chavan would be a useful complement to a planned meeting between the President and Chavan during his Washington visit. It would provide him greater exposure to Administration views on the direction in which we would like to see our ties evolve, and enable you to discuss current Congressional attitudes with him.

Subject: Call on the President by Indian Foreign Minister

Indian Foreign Minister Y.B. Chavan will be in Washington October 6-7 for a meeting of the Indo-U.S. Joint Commission. The Indians have requested an appointment for Chavan to see the President.

The Department recommends that if his schedule permits the President agree to see Chavan. The Foreign Minister will be available the afternoon of October 6 and morning and afternoon October 7. Since the President saw Chavan's predecessor, Swaran Singh, last year, the Indians would regard it as a strongly negative political signal were he unwilling to receive Chavan now. Of late, Mrs. Gandhi has been signalling her interest in improved relations with the U.S. Most recent signs were her unusual gesture in attending Ambassador Saxbe's dinner for Congressman Cederberg and India's reversal of its previous anti-U.S. position on the Puerto Rican issue at the U.N.

We remain interested in the effort to develop mature and productive relations with India and believe we should use the Chavan visit to further this process. Apart from its symbolic importance, a call on the President would provide an opportunity to emphasize at the highest level that U.S. interests and policies toward South Asia remain as Secretary Kissinger stated when he visited the subcontinent in October 1974. Given India's domestic unpopularity, it is possible the session with Chavan will prompt some criticism; however, we do not believe it will spark serious controversy.

Dear Judge Mashburn: Telfair

The President has asked me to thank you for your letter of July 7 and respond to your questions. I apologize for this long delay in replying.

U. S. relations with India over the past decade have had both political and humanitarian dimensions. Our political relationship has suffered some difficulties in recent years, but as you note, the Administration is attempting to repair these relations.

The U. S. humanitarian effort to assist India's economic development has also recently changed. In this context, it is important to note that at least 50% of India's population lives below what is generally considered the minimum subsistence level. During the 1960's, U. S. assistance to India averaged \$650 million annually and focused on industrial development. Recent efforts have been more modest and focus on food production. The President has requested \$76 million for development assistance to India in 1976 plus some direct food aid under Public Law 480. The Administration believes that the direction and size of our assistance efforts in India are compatible with our political interests there.

Your other concern was that the Federal Government not make donations to New York and other cities to bail them out of financial difficulties. A number of local jurisdictions are experiencing such difficulties caused by the recession, inflation, declining tax bases and other factors. The Mayor of New York has discussed with the President the fiscal problems that his city faces. While recognizing the critical nature of the problems of the cities, the Administration has indicated that it cannot attempt to help resolve those problems on an ad hoc basis of providing aid to individual cities. In the case of New York City, you may have noted that the State of New York has established the Municipal Assistance Corporation to help put New York City on a sound financial footing.

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The program of General Revenue Sharing is already providing a significant measure of financial aid to all state and local jurisdictions. These jurisdictions also obtain financial aid through categorical grant programs funded by the Federal Government. While the Administration considers existing financial aid programs sufficient to assist state and local governments through their current economic difficulties, we are keeping a close watch on the developing fiscal situation in all sectors of the economy. I can assure you, however, that there is no current plan to bail out individual cities.

With reference to your thoughts on America's railroads and Federal efforts to ensure their continued viability, I should like to point out the following:

First, railroad employees in fact receive lower wages than other transportation employees, and since World War II their salaries (on a percentage basis) have risen more slowly than those of employees in trucking, waterways, or the airline industry;

Second, railroad unions strike rarely, due in part to the cumbersome provisions of the Railway Labor Act. There has not been a national rail strike since 1971, and that strike was the first in many years;

Third, the Federal Government is not bailing out the railroads; it is providing interim operating assistance to a few bankrupt carriers (notably the Penn Central) pending an income-based reorganization under the provisions of the Regional Rail Reorganization Act of 1973. Financial assistance has been necessary to prevent a complete shutdown of the Northeastern railroads and consequent paralysis of the entire nation's commerce. Since such assistance began, in 1974, there have been no significant rail strikes and railroad employees have not received wage



increases of greater magnitude than those received by other American workers. This Administration believes very deeply that America's railroads must be privately owned and operated, and will continue to work for a strong private railroad system.

The President appreciates your views on these important matters.

(Important note: The draft below deals only with Judge Mashburn's question about U.S. relations with India and does not answer his questions about domestic matters.)

Dear Judge Mashburn:

With regard to our relationship with India and the other South Asian nations, we believe that our overall interests are the maintenance of regional stability, normalization of relations among the countries of the area, and the avoidance of outside power interference. These interests require, over the long run, mature and stable relations between ourselves and India under which differences between us will be dealt with on a basis of mutual respect for each other's interests and sovereignty.

We continue to have a long-standing interest in the stability and economic development of India. Since India has been one of the countries hardest hit by the increases in world prices for vital commodities such as food, fuel, and fertilizer, we believe both our longer-term interests and our humanitarian concerns dictate leaving open the possibility of a modest program of economic assistance for India.



Dear Mr. President:

Recently I have read in the papers where Mrs. Indira Gandhi, of India, is talking about repairing relations between our two countries. I am writing this letter, Mr. President, urging you to remember all the things we have done for India in the past, and how little they have done for us, including voting against us on every question that has come up in the United Nations. I am confident that if we were about to be defeated in a war, they would join with our enemies.

I hope you will make no recommendations that we give assistance to India in any form in the future. If we have something they need, let them pay for it, or do without. (incidentally, this is good advice concerning our dealings with the rest of the world).

I also hope that you will not recommend that Congress make donations to New York and other cities of the United States, to bail them out of financial difficulties. In my opinion, Mr.President, it is not right to let politicians waste local money to promote themselves for office and then call on the tax-payers over the United States to make good when they run deficits.

I would like to point out what has happened in the case of the railroads and of the various local transportation companies in the various cities of the United States; when the Federal Government began to bail out the railroads, the Unions continue to strike for higher wages and today there is no relationship between the income of the railroads and the amount they must pay their unionized labor. (This is true also with regard to street Railway Companies in most of our Cities.

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
