Members of our organization are deeply concerned about the recurrent surfacing of statements looking toward the curtailment and elimination of United States information services or broadcasts into the various republics of the Soviet Union.

At a time when the principles which guided the growth of the United States of America are brought forth in an endless stream in conjunction with bicentennial observances, it does our American heritage little credit to diminish the access to outside information of the peoples in the curtained world—those in the Soviet Union—who need it most.

Time and again the American people have uncompromisingly throughout their history declared their support for freedom of speech, press and related ideals. No greater reiteration can a people, endowed by existing circumstances with leadership of the free world, make than to continue to support the means for beaming words of truth and priceless hope toward those who are by directive and surveillance kept uninformed and misinformed.

In detente, according to pronouncements from your office and your administration, understanding relationships between the peoples of the Soviet Union and the United States are to be encouraged. To this end nothing is more important than knowledge of what is happening not only in both nations but in all parts of the world.

When Lincoln spoke of a nation that could not remain half slave and half free, he exposed a fundamental criterion for America's behavior. By silencing Radio Liberty, or Radio Free Europe, we promote the ideas of tyrants, with peril to ourselves and all free peoples.
