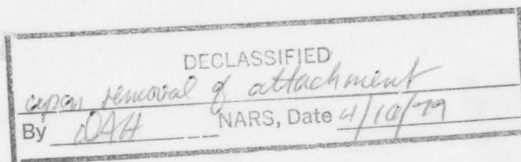

Another problem concerns Ghana's desire for landing rights in the US for Air Ghana which our Civil Aeronautics Board refuses to grant on the grounds an Air Ghana schedule to New York would not be viable given the demand-supply equation on existing schedules. The inability to reach an agreement with Ghana on this issue may cost Pan Am the rights it now enjoys to service Accra.

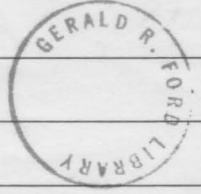

Jack B.

Ambassador ^xKubisch and Greek Coordination Minister Papaligouras will sign the \$65 million Supporting Assistance loan agreement in Athens on Wednesday, September 22. A signing statement and press release will be issued in Athens.

You have our memorandum on the Greek Parliamentarians' visit (Log #5099, September 17) which notes that the President has the option of an Oval Office meeting. This supporting assistance loan could provide the centerpiece.

Even if a meeting is not scheduled, I believe that issuing a press release in Washington concerning the loan would illustrate the continuing importance the Administration places on US-Greek relations. If you agree, we will forward the press release at Tab A to Les Janka for his handling.



BIOGRAPHY - Colonel Federico Abundio MALDONALDO Gularte

Republic of Guatemala

Colonel Maldonado is 52 years old and is a career Army officer with a Master's Degree in Public Administration from Harvard. He is intelligent, competent and very ambitious. His overriding aim is to be President of Guatemala. He ran for that office in 1962, but a military coup overthrew the government and the election was cancelled.

Maldonado has been out of Guatemala almost continuously since then on various diplomatic and military assignments, including: 1963-66: Assistant Military Attaché in Washington and Vice Secretary on the Inter-American Defense Board; 1966-69: Military Attaché in San Salvador; 1969-70: Military Attaché in Mexico; 1970-72: Military Attaché in the United States; 1972-74: Ambassador to Mexico; and 1974-76: Ambassador to San Salvador.

Maldonado has been involved in politics throughout his military career, and for just that reason the Guatemalan leadership has preferred to keep him out of the country for most of the past thirteen years. In Guatemalan terms, he is a moderate and is a friend of the United States. He is strongly anti-communist. He is open and articulate and can be forceful in his views. He is a good conversationalist and will offer information unsolicited at times, but can be sensitive to criticism of his country.

In addition to Harvard, Maldonado has attended the London School of Economics and Georgetown University. He speaks fluent English and is married to the former Lilian Ruby Estrada, a granddaughter of the former Guatemalan Chief of State, Manuel ESTRADA Cabrera, 1898-1920. Four of their children are U.S. citizens, including their eldest son, Abundio, who attended West Point.

The Bureau of Inter-American Affairs believes that Colonel Maldonado is well qualified to represent his country as Ambassador to the United States. A thorough search of U.S. Government sources reveals no grounds for objection.

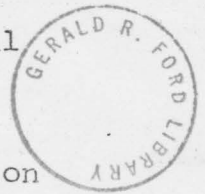

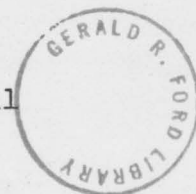


