





I. PURPOSE

This will be a courtesy call as Ambassador McAuliffe prepares to depart for his post in Budapest.

## II. BACKGROUND, PARTICIPANTS AND PRESS ARRANGEMENTS

A. Background: Ambassador McAuliffe is a career Foreign Service Officer, and this will be his first ambassadorial post. During his career (biographic sketch at Tab A) he has skillfully performed a variety of demanding assignments. Most recently he has served as Deputy to Ambassador Rumsfeld and Ambassador Bruce at the U.S. Mission NATO, his current post.

Ambassador McAuliffe goes to Budapest at a time when Hungary remains under clear Soviet domination in the Warsaw Pact. The Hungarians are eager to improve relations with the United States, but this is a very slow process because of their political situation. For example, following Soviet rejection of the Trade Bill, the Hungarian Foreign Ministry informed our Embassy that Hungary could not accept any preconditions to expansion of trade.

- 2. Don Rumsfeld has spoken very highly of you and of your abilities, and that is a sound endorsement.
- 3. After the several years you have spent dealing with the challenges confronting the United States and the fourteen other members of the NATO Alliance, I am sure you will find your new responsibilities -- dealing with only one country -- easy by comparison.

The President today announced his intention to nominate Eugene V. McAuliffe, of Jamaica Plain, Massachusetts, to be Ambassador to Hungary. He will succeed Richard F. Pedersen who is resigning to return to private life.

Since 1972, Mr. McAulisse has been serving as Deputy Chief of Mission of the United States, North Atlantic Treaty Organization in Brussels. From 1970 to 1972 he was a Political Officer, Supreme Headquarters, Allied Powers in Europe. In Brussels in 1968, he served as Deputy Chief of Mission with the personal rank of Minister in Madrid, Spain, until 1970. He was Director of Atlantic Political and Military Assairs for the Department of State from 1966 to 1968. During the period from 1963 to 1966, he served as Director of the Office of Public Services and then Executive Secretary of the Policy Planning Staff for the Department of State.

From 1958 to 1962, Mr. McAuliffe was assigned as Political Officer in Mexico City. In 1954, he was Executive Assistant and then Chief of Reports and Operations Staff of the Executive Secretariat for the Department of State, until 1958. He entered the Foreign Service in 1948 and was assigned as Consular and Political Officer in Berlin.

Mr. McAuliffe was born on November 25, 1918, in Boston, Massachusetts. He received his A.B. degree from Boston College in 1940. He attended the National War College from 1962 to 1963. He served with the United States Army from 1942 to 1947.

Dear Mr. President:

It was a great honor for me to serve as your Special Representative at the ceremonies incident to the Eleven-hundredth Anniversary of the settlement of Iceland which was held on July 28 and 29, 1974, at Thingvellir and Reykjavik.

This was a very interesting occasion at which nine Special Invitees represented the Scandinavian countries, Ireland, Canada and the United States. Our Ambassador, Mr. Frederick Irving, expressed great appreciation over your sending a representative to take part in this ceremony which means so much to the Icelanders. In addition to these Special Invitees, there were diplomats from twenty-five additional countries from throughout the world including the People's Democratic Republic of North Korea and the People's Republic of China.

Ambassador Irving is a skilled professional and apparently doing a good job. The controversy over the continuance of the NATO base at Keflavik and concern over the protection of Iceland's fishing rights still dominate political talk. The intensities of these issues may, however, be eased when a new government is formed. In any event, Ambassador Irving is sensitive to these problems and seems quite able to represent our positions in both matters.

In regard to the crude oil supplied by the Russians, I completely endorse our official position to remain uninvolved unless another incident occurs and Ambassador Irving recommends that we provide assistance.

I was able to examine Iceland's low-temperature geothermal system which is used for domestic hot water and home heating. I also discussed the utilization of their high-temperature geothermal system which they have in



Dear President Ford:



We take this opportunity, on behalf of the more than 30 million Iranians living under Shah Pahlavi's rule and the thousands of Iranians exiled from their homeland by that monarch, to congratulate you on your succession to the Presidency of the United States. Knowing your well-deserved reputation for honesty and frankness in the conduct of both your public and your private life, we rejoice will all Americans not only because the sorrow and tragedy of Watergate can now truly be put behind us, but also because now is a time for new beginnings, a time when the long friendship between the Iranian and the American people may be renewed and may bring new hope to all Iranians.

Mr. President, for many years the people of Iran have felt an instinctive friendship for the people of America, recognizing in the citizens of the Great Republic a quality of sincerity and humane compassion seldom found elsewhere in the world. We also see America in her historic role as a protector of the political, civil and religious freedoms of less fortunate people all around the globe. For these reasons, we support the continued growth of business relationships and activities between Iranian and American companies, as well as the initiation of humane and wise agreements between the governments of Iran and the United States. Far from opposing such business relationships, we support them wholeheartedly and will continue to support them as a major force which we hope will ultimately bring full civil rights and freedom from suffering to the Iranian people.

What we oppose, however, is Shah Pahlavi's misuse of United States business and military interests and his subversion of major American corporations' political influence to force their support of his tatalitarian regime. As recent examples of such activities, it is necessary only to cite the Shah's effort through the State Department to squelch a study by the Federal Energy Administration of U.S. oil

companies' involvements and activities abroad. The Shah's unsuccessful effort to gain control of the American firm which manufactures the F-14 fighter jet through an illegal loan of Iranian funds also pprings to mind as a recent example of his unwholesome international machinations.

Further, we oppose the Shah's use of American business interests in Iran to enlarge his own furtune, rather than drawing on American expertise and export capabilities to help ease the suffering of our people. According to surveys conducted recently by the United Nations and the U.S. in Iran, 22 million of the Shah's subjects eat only one meal per day, and that lone meal rarely includes even subsistence nutritional value. Half of all Iranian children never reach the age of five, but fall vittim to the malnutrition and childhood diseases which have been allowed to rage unchecked under Shah Pahlavi's government. Finally, 70% of all Iranians cannot read or write. These horrifying statistics take on an even grimmer hue when one pauses to reflect that Iran is one of the most wealthy nations in the world, in terms of per capita disposable income. Yet none of this wealth reaches the people.

Iran's vast oil income, not to mention her mineral resources and the talents of her people, could in only a few years lift all Iranian citizens from starvation to prosperity, from dangerous political instability to the flowering strength that only democracy and civil peace can bring to a nation. Yet these dreams have not even begun to be realized, for Iran's incredible wealth has been allocated by Shah Fahlavi to arms purchases and unrealistic, premature schemes of heavy industrialization.

Iran under the Pahlavi government has become one of the biggest arms purchasers in the Middle East. Almost daily, the Shah's government announces new agreements for the purchase of America's most sophisticated jet fighter aircraft and advanced attack helicopters, for French nuclear know-how, for medium-range American missiles, for American and British tanks, for British warships -- and the list continues to grow beyond simple enumeration on these pages. As in most dictatorships, the focus in Iran increasingly is on the military, and on more and ever more deadly military equipment. Ironically, no Iranians even know how to operate much of this military equipment, and therefore America's military training garrison in Iran continues to mushroom in size. And the advice given to the Shah by these American advisors has undeniably contributed to the almost incredibly growth of the Shah's arms purchasing program. Since early 1973, the Pahlavi government has spent more than \$4 billion on purchases of American weapons alone, and at the present time the Shah stands committed to spending an additional \$3 billion for American weapons in the near future. While his people starve, Shah Pahlavi is turning Iran into one of the world's largest warehouses of death-dealing weapons, all on the advice of his American military advisors.

Training in the history of diplomacy and war is not necessary for one to perceive the clear international dangers inherent in the policies of Shah Pahlavi's government. No matter how large an arsenal

Iran may eventually hold, it would mean little against a Soviet invasion. Ultimately, Iran would have to depend on the Western World, led by the United States, for her defense if such a tragedy ever took place.

Therefore, Mr. President, Shah Pahlavi's astronomical spending for military procurement can mean only that he aspires to the enlargement of his kingdom -- and that he fears the anger of his enslaved mitizens. Iran's recent history of escalating border incidents with Iraq, Turkey and Pakistan, as well as her involvement in the Yemeni conflict, points clearly to expansionist ambitions. And as to the Shah's use of his military strength to enforce his rule, there can be no doubt. The economic slavery which he has instituted under cover of his pseudo-White Revolution, and which is enforced by his political secret police (SAVAK), is the same as any other sort of involuntary servitude. Iran is a nation in chains, scourged by a mentally ill monarch into desperate and dangerous expansionist military policies.

The abhorrent nature of Shah Pahlavi's government is no secret. Almost daily, the Western press carries new, terse announcements of political executions in Iran. These official admissions of tyranny, however, represent only a small portion of the pain inflacted on our people by the Shah's regime. Iranian opium, which is produced under a royal monopoly, flows under cover of diplomatic immunity directly into organized criminal circles in America and Europe. According to U.N. statistics, the number of opium and heroin addicts in Iran has grown from 600000nin 1969, when the Shah set up his monopoly on opium, to nearly 3,000,000 today. The Shah claims that his monopoly on opium controls that drug, but the statistics show that he has enlarged drug trafficking rather than cut it off. Further, most of the supposed executions of drug traffickers are actually blatant murders of political and religious leaders who opposed the Shah's regime, according to reports by European commissions which have investigated current conditions in Iran.

The dream of peace and prosperity for Iran has never become reality because the Pahlavi government has consistently used Iran's oil and other revenues to buy military power, instead of applying those funds to ease the suffering of our people. Mr. President, we are not against trade between Iran and America, but why can that trade not be in the form of educational and health services and facilities, agricultural expertise, and all the thousands of American commodities and products which could improve the quality of life in Iran? Why can that trade not represent prosperity for all Iranians, instead of mushrooming military power for the Shah?

The tragic truth is that the Shah, whose mental illness has unbalanced his judgement, is converting America's best-intentioned efforts at assistance into new weapons of tyranny. The unfortunate appointment of former CIA Director Richard Helms to Teheran as USSS Ambassador regrettably has led the Shah to believe his dictatorship enjoys the wholehearted support

of the United States. For the Shah and many others in the Middle East remember that it was Mr. Helms who engineered the CIA coup which returned the Shah to the Peacock Throne against the people's clearly-expressed wishes. Mr. Helms' presence in Teheran not only has contributed to the strengthening of the Shah's iron grip on Iran but also has created serious misunderstandings between the Iranian and the American people. We have great respect for Mr. Helms' successful career with the CIA, and no less respect for the CIA's important role in protecting the security of the United States. However, in the present circumstances, Mr. Helms' presence in Iran has caused distrust between the Iranian and the American people.

All Iranians know and cherish America's belief intthe freedom of all human beings, and all Iranians know how often and how bravely America has defended her beliefs all around the globe. It is therefore difficult to understand America's apparent support of Shah Pahlavi and his malign regime. America's burgeoning arms sales to the Shah, the presence of greater and greater numbers of American military advisors in Iran, and most important Mr. Helms' presence in Iran — all of this has been hard for Iranians to understand.

Therefore, Mr. President, on behalf of the Iranian people and with all due respect we address the following requests to you:

FIRST, WE REQUEST THAT AMBASSADOR HELMS BE RECALLED AND REPLACED BY FORMER AMBASSADOR JOSEPH FALLON, a man who, in his earlier service in Teheran, earned the respect and love of all Iranians. Replacing Mr. Helms with Mr. Fallon or any other honorable diplomat would go a long way towards repairing full friendship between the Iranian and the American people.

SECOND, WE REQUEST THAT AMERICA'S DISPROPORTIONATELY LARGE GARRISON OF MILITARY ADVISORS IN IRAN BE REDUCED TO A MORE NORMAL AND APPROPRIATE LEVEL. As long as this garrison remains so large and visible, its presence can only be interpreted by the Iranian people as active support of the Pahlavi dictatorship by the United States government. It is not necessary to create such ill-will between our mations in order to keep Iran strong; her present ability to meet all military challenges short of total gmobal cataclysm without these American advisors is undoubted.

AND THIRD, WE REQUEST THAT YOU LIMIT STRICTLY, OR CUT OFF ENTIRELY. IF POSSIBLE, AMERICA'S ARMS SALES TO THE PAHLAVI REGIME. There can be no question but that Iran is the strongest nation in the Middle East by far, and we would not have it any other way. But any further sales of weapons to the Shah can only help him to increase the level of his depredations on our fellow Iranian citizens and encourage him in his policies of aggression abroad. These expansionist policies and adventures not only harm Iran but endanger the peace of the whole world, and only America can limit this danger by limiting her arms sales to the Shah.

We pray that at this time you will turn a fresh eye on the serious human, political and military problems which now fester in Iran. Mr. President, in your edoquent inaugural address you reaffirmed your belief in the freedom of mankind throughout the world, and we know your total dedication to that great goal. It is in the spirit of openness and honesty, and in total dedication to the goal of achieving peace and freedom and prosperity for all men, that we address these requests to you. We hope to receive your reply as early as is convenient for you.

Thank you, Mr. President, and may God bless you and America in your search for true peace and freedom for all mankind.

Dear Mr. President:

Your handsome Christmas card was much appreciated as well as your thoughtful letter responding to my doubts concerning your amnesty program.

One of the many tough questions awaiting your decision is whether or not you should encourage Richard Helms to resign as U.S. Ambassador to Iran.

Because I have had a recent personal experience with Mr. Helms I thought it might be useful to you to consider these facts along with my strong recommendation that you encourage his early retirement as a diplomat.

I trust you entirely to see that the facts about CIA internal spying on U.S. citizens are brought into the white light of public scrutiny and appropriate action be taken if official deceit and wrongdoing are revealed.

In addition to my personal experience, I am also convinced that the former CIA chief should not be an ambassador, especially in Iran where the CIA played an activist role about 20 years ago.

My misgivings about Helms were borne out when I went to Teheran last month. The Embassy had long known that I was coming and that I wished their help in arranging appointments with Iranian officials so I could talk about seeing certain political prisoners. I had discussed my mission with the Iranian Desk officer at the State Department, and had written to the Shah and to Ambassador Helms. When my flight from Baghdad was delayed I cabled Mr. Helms a new arrival date.

Even so, Ambassador Helms was unable to obtain for me an appointment with any Iranian official. This was in sharp contrast to the cooperation which I received in April of this year from Ambassador Popper and his staff when I was on a similar mission in Chile.

Mr. Helms' second in command, Minister-Counselor Jack Miklos, consoling me in the Ambassador's office, told me that the Ambassador was tied up with the U.S. Chief of Naval Operations and that he, Miklos, had tried unsuccessfully three times to persuade Iranian officials to give me an appointment. He did say that the Shah had received my letter.

Miklos said the Iranians gave no reason and when I asked him why he didn't try to find out, he had no excuse. His own explanation was that recent adverse articles in <a href="Newsweek">Newsweek</a> and <a href="Harpers">Harpers</a> magazines closed the doors to me.

The Embassy was aware, Miklos said, of Senator Mark O. Hatfield's request that the Embassy render "all possible assistance" to me in my "humanitarian effort to assist political prisoners." It seemed to me that the Embassy exerted very little effort, if any, to help me an Iranian official.

On the basis of my experience at our Teheran Embassy I conclude that my not seeing any prisoners in Iran was the fault of our Ambassador, Richard Helms, and not the fault of the Shah or any of his officials. I have good reason to believe that Ambassador Popper is deeply concerned about human rights. I can't believe that Iranian officials would refuse to see an American lawyer, even a former Member of Congress, to talk about political prisoners. They have more confidence in themselves and their policies.

My schedule made it impossible for me to stay in Teheran any longer and I am now seeking to make my approach through Iran's Ambassador to the United States. But I do feel the United States would be better served in Iran by someone without a CIA background and by someone less insensitive in matters involving fundamental human rights.

Dear Mr. President:



Ten months ago I wrote the Secretary of State indicating that I believed it was in our best interest and in the interest of continuing good Iranian-American relations that Ambassador Richard Helms be replaced. I write you today urging once again that Ambassador Helms' resignation be sought and accepted.

Without prejudging any of the complicated issues involving actions by the Central Intelligence Agency in years when Mr. Helms headed that agency, it is clear that Mr. Helms may have to be in Washington many times in the coming months, that he will have to defend himself against serious charges of misconduct from responsible sources, and that he may have to resign should any investigation of him by the Department of Justice or another agency produce evidence of wrongdoing.

Since I wrote the Secretary of State in February, evidence has been produced by the Senate Select Intelligence Committee, among other groups, that suggests errors of omission, as well as commission by Mr. Helms. For example, the evidence is that Mr. Helms, when Deputy Director, failed to inform either his agency or the White House of efforts to kill Prime Minister Fidel Castro of Cuba and that Mr. Helms advised the Congress that the Central Intelligence Agency was not involved in Chile during the early 1970s.

It is clear that in the next few months Ambassador Helms will have to answer for several aspects of his conduct while he was with the Central Intelligence Agency.

I seriously doubt whether this country should be represented, or can be well represented, by any person whose credibility is under such attacks. I also fear the implications of Ambassador Helms having to leave Iran under difficult circumstances months from now when all the evidence may be gathered on his conduct involving matters that arise from an important domestic inquiry which has nothing to do with United States-Iranian relations. The implications of an Ambassador leaving any important and friendly state under fire can be far-reaching and, whether intended or not, it has the potential of casting an ugly pall over hundreds of Americans serving our Nation around the globe. I would like to avoid any such situation.

State has transmitted a request from Ambassador Helms to pay a courtesy call on the President in January (attached). Helms has recently submitted his letter of resignation and will be concluding his tour in Tehran in December, returning here in early January. Apart from possibly reflecting on US-Iranian relations, we do not know what else the Ambassador may wish to discuss with the President. He will want a photo taken.

At Tab A is a schedule proposal recommending a brief courtesy call, if you feel this is appropriate. If you foresee a problem of precedent with other returning Ambassadors (seeking a final call and photo with the President), I suggest that the meeting not be announced but could be confirmed on an if-asked basis. In his letter to NEA, Ambassador Helms also asked to meet with you and Bill Hyland around the same time in January. Your offices could let me know if you and Bill are agreeable.
