#### I. PURPOSE

To view a sampling of the many Bicentennial gifts which are being received at the White House on behalf of the Nation.

#### BACKGROUND, PARTICIPANTS AND PRESS PLAN II.

- A. Background: The Bicentennial has brought an avalanche of gifts to the White House from individuals, groups, organizations and commercial enterprises. Each of these is received on behalf of the Nation.
  - The range of gift items is as wide as imagination will permit. Each donor, whether individual or commercial enterprise, has used this means to participate in Bicentennial commemoration.
  - 2. Many of the gifts from individual donors represent personal talent.
  - 3. None of the gifts have been solicited and those received from commercial enterprises are accepted with the provision that acceptance does not indicate White House endorsement and may not be used in that manner.
  - 4. The gifts will go on permanent display during this year, starting in March, at the Visitor's Center located in the Great Hall of the Commerce Building.
  - 5. It is estimated at this time that between 300-400 gifts have been received with more coming in daily.

- 6. Only a few are of Foreign origin but none in this collection are from Foreign governments.
- B. Participants: Assisting with the tour will be Counseller John O. Marsh, Jr., Dr. Theodore C. Marrs and Milton E. Mitler. Also among participants will be the staff of the Bicentennial Office (Sandra Drake, Annita Holland, David Snyder and Bonnie Dreyer who is a temporary college internee). The Designers of the display who are also designing the Great Hall exhibit, Mr. Russell Hendrickson and Ms. Helen Schreider, both of the Interior Department will be in attendance.
- C. Press Plan: A pool of White House reporters will proceed through the display with the President. Other White House Press will be invited to view the display after the President leaves.

Dear Mr. President:

The Pueblo of Zuni, New Mexico, has contacted me with regard to their desire to make a presentation to you at their Bicentennial Project.

The people of Zuni Pueblo plan to exhibit Indian arts and crafts to the visitors at the Philadelphia Bicentennial, as this will be the only manned exhibit representing New Mexico and the Indian way of life.

The children of the schools in Zuni, New Mexico, competed in the design of a Bicentennial Coin which would represent the sentiments of a Zuni child, whose ancestors were some of the first Americans, in the birth of our country. Two entries were chosen for the front and the back of the coin and are now being prepared by a well known Zuni artist; upon completion, they will be sent to a mint to be processed for collector's items.

Because this will be the first Indian Bicentennial Coin in the history of our country, and a wonderful peace offering on our country's 200th Birthday, it is the hope of the people of Zuni Pueblo that they might make a presentation to you, Mr. President, of the Zuni Bicentennial Coin. It is their wish to make this presentation a very warm and rewarding experience, also symbolizing peace, strength, and pride in the land by the first Americans.

The presentation could be made in ten minutes, or, if you would prefer, it could be more elaborately dramatized with colorful Zuni dancers, the Zuni Tribal Band in concert, and covered by a national broadcasting station. Also, depending upon your schedule, Mr. President, the presentation could be arranged either in Washington, D. C., or in Philadelphia.

#### I. PURPOSE

To receive a silver Masonic Medallion with likeness of Presidents Washington and Ford. (850 serially numbered silver coins have been minted and thousands also of bronze medallions which will be distributed nationally through Grand Lodge networks.)

#### II. BACKGROUND, PARTICIPANTS AND PRESS PLAN

A. <u>Background</u>: The Grand Lodge of the District of Columbia invited you to deliver an address which was to have been held this Spring. You could not accept.

You received your initial Masonic degrees in the District of Columbia as a courtesy to your Michigan home Lodge.

- C. Press Plan: Full photo opportunity for press corps. White House photographers to take photos of presentations for use in various national Masonic magazines.

#### III. FORMAT AND TALKING POINTS

A. Format: Guests will be assembled in the Rose Garden and will be introduced to you by the current Grand Master, John Layton (former D.C. Police Commissioner).

Layton and Deputy Grand Master Charles Brewer will present silver coin number one to you. They will describe its Bicentennial meaning. They will also give you a bronze coin neckless for Mrs. Ford.,

You will respond with brief informal remarks.

#### B. Suggested Talking Points:

Most Worshipful Layton, distinguished officers of the Grand Lodge, Honorable Past Grand Masters:

I am grateful for the privilege of receiving the number one Silver Medallion commemorating the Bicentennial of our Nation. I appreciate being a part of your celebration. As you know, I received my Masonic degrees in the District of Columbia as a courtesy to my home Lodge in Grand Rapids, Michigan. Therefore, I have a special fondness for my brethren here.

There were only about three thousand Masons in our population of some three million back in 1776. Yet those brothers were leaders in our fight for freedom and independence. Many signers of the Declaration of Independence were Masons. Patriots like Benjamin Franklin, Paul Revere, John Hancock, George Washington and others, were in the fraternity. In fact, fourteen of our Presidents, nineteen Vice Presidents, hundreds of distinguished Congressmen, Judges, military leaders, as well as leaders in business and labor, have been proud members of the craft.

The two hundred years of progress and growth of this Nation are cause for celebrating our birthday. But as we celebrate our Nation's Bicentennial, we will actually be laying the cornerstone of America's third century. I am confident that the inspired leadership which Masons have given this country for the past 200 years will continue throughout the closing years of this century and into the next.
