Historic Mansion In Pocantico Hills Dedicated by Ford

POCANTICO HILLS, N. Y., Nov. 21— President Ford played golf, attended church and dedicated a Victorian stone mansion on the sprawling Rockefeller family estate here today as a national historical landmark.

Relaxing on the 3,500-acre estate as weekend guests of Vice President Rockefeller, the President and Mrs. Ford made only one public appearance, attending a quiet service at the nondenominational Union Church in Tarrytown.

The President played morning and afternoon rounds of golf with the Vice President and his two brothers, David and Lawrence, on the private course on the estate grounds.

And in a brief private ceremony, Mr. Ford presented a bronze plaque to the three Rockefellers to dedicate Kykuit, the 14-room mansion built 73 years ago by their grandfather, John D. Rockefeller Sr., as the centerpiece of the family estate.

"I am happy to be here today to designate this mansion as a landmark and to acknowledge a great humanitarian and philanthropist," Mr. Ford said during the ceremony, which was attended by Mrs. Ford and other members of the Rockefeller family.

The estate was officially designated a landmark last May 11 by Interior Sec-

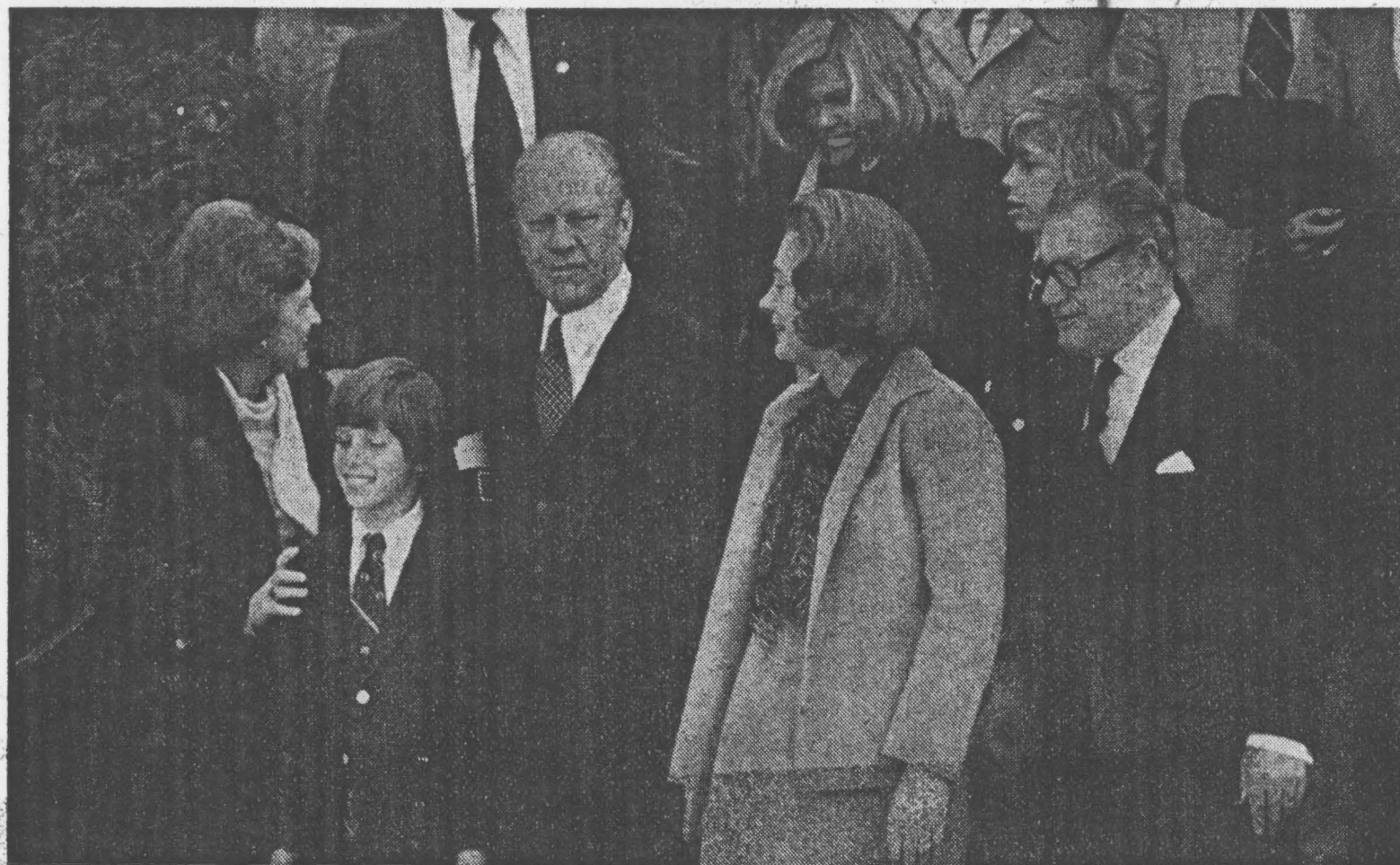

WASHINGTON (UPI) -- A PRIVATE DEDICATION CEREMONY WILL BE HELD THIS WEEKEND DESIGNATING VICE PRESIDENT NELSON ROCKEFELLER'S POCANTICO HILLS, N.Y., ESTATE AS A NATIONAL HISTORIC LANDMARK.

PRESIDENT AND MRS. FORD WILL SPEND THE WEEKEND AT THE ESTATE AS GUESTS OF THE VICE PRESIDENT AND JOIN MEMBERS OF THE ROCKEFELLER FAMILY FOR THE SPECIAL CEREMONY SUNDAY AFTERNOON.

NO NEWS COVERAGE WILL BE ALLOWED, ACCORDING TO ROCKEFELLER SPOKESMAN JOHN MULLIGAN, BECAUSE THE VICE PRESIDENT "CONSIDERS THIS A FAMILY AND PRIVATE AFFAIR."

AS SOME CONSOLATION TO REPORTERS WHO WILL FOLLOW THE PRESIDENT TO NEARBY TARRYTOWN, N.Y., BUT WERE DENIED ACCESS TO THE CEREMONY, ROCKEFELLER EXTENDED AN INVITATION TO BRUNCH IN THE "PLAYHOUSE" ON THE ESTATE GROUNDS.

THE ESTATE COVERS 3,500 ACRES, BUT ONLY THE 249-ACRE SECTION KNOWN AS "THE PARK" WAS DESIGNATED A NATIONAL LANDMARK. IT JOINS ABOUT 1,300 OTHER PLACES -- MOST OF THEM PRIVATELY OWNED -- IN THIS RELATIVELY NEW CATEGORY OF HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE.

THE ESTATE LANDS WERE PURCHASED AND THE FIRST HOUSE BUILT IN THE LATE 1800S BY JOHN ROCKEFELLER, A SYMBOL OF WEALTH AND INDUSTRIAL POWER IN 19TH CENTURY AMERICA.

THE FIRST HOUSE BURNED DOWN IN 1902 AND REPLACED WITH THE CURRENT STRUCTURE IN 1909. IT BEARS THE SAME NAME, KYKUIT -- DUTCH FOR LOOKOUT -- AS THE ORIGINAL HOUSE.

THE ARCHITECTURE OF THE MANSION IS GEORGIAN AND REFLECTS BOTH SIMPLICITY AND QUALITY. IT IS SURROUNDED BY FORMAL GARDENS, AND ENJOYS A VIEW OF THE HUDSON RIVER, ROLLING HILLS AND WOODLANDS.

THE DESIGNATION WILL INVOLVE NO FEDERAL FUNDS EXCEPT FOR THE COST OF A PLAQUE AND CERTIFICATE AND CONSULTATION SERVICES AVAILABLE TO ENSURE PROPER PRESERVATION.

IT WAS THE SIGNIFICANT ROLE OF JOHN ROCKEFELLER IN AMERICAN HISTORY, NOT THE FACT THAT NELSON ROCKEFELLER IS VICE PRESIDENT, THAT LED TO DESIGNATION OF THE ESTATE AS A NATIONAL LANDMARK, SPOKESMAN SAID.

IN AN ANNOUNCEMENT OF THE DECISION MAY 11, INTERIOR SECRETARY THOMAS KLEPPA SAID THE NAME OF THE SENIOR ROCKEFELLER IS "SYNONYMOUS WITH AMERICA ... HE IS THE EPITOME OF BOTH SUCCESS AND OF PHILANTHROPY."

ORIGINALLY, THE WHITE HOUSE INDICATED THE SUNDAY CEREMONIES WOULD INVOLVE TRANSFER OF THE ESTATE TO THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT. THIS WAS QUICKLY REVISED AS SPOKESMEN STRESSED NO TRANSFER OF LAND OR CHANGE OF OWNERSHIP IS INVOLVED.

MULLIGAN SAID NEGOTIATIONS ARE UNDER WAY, HOWEVER, THAT ULTIMATELY COULD MAKE THE ESTATE PUBLIC PROPERTY.

Fords Weekending At Rockefeller Estate

President Ford met yesterday with White House aides to discuss the new federal budget before flying to New York for a weekend at Vice President Rockefeller's historic estate overlooking the Hudson River.

Ford aides said the President and his wife Betty joined the Rockefeller family at their home in Pocantico Hills for dinner last night and planned a quiet day today that would include church services and a private ceremony marking the designation of the 63-year-old Rockefeller house, known as "Kykuit," as a national historic landmark.

The President must, by law, submit his new budget to Congress before Jimmy Carter takes office Jan. 20. That budget, which undoubtedly will be revised by Carter, may be one subject on tomorrow's agenda when the president-elect and Ford meet at the White House for the first time.

White House Press Secretary Ronald Nessen said the Carters had accepted Ford's invitation to use Blair House, the official guest residence across Pennsylvania Avenue from the White House, during their visit in Washington.
