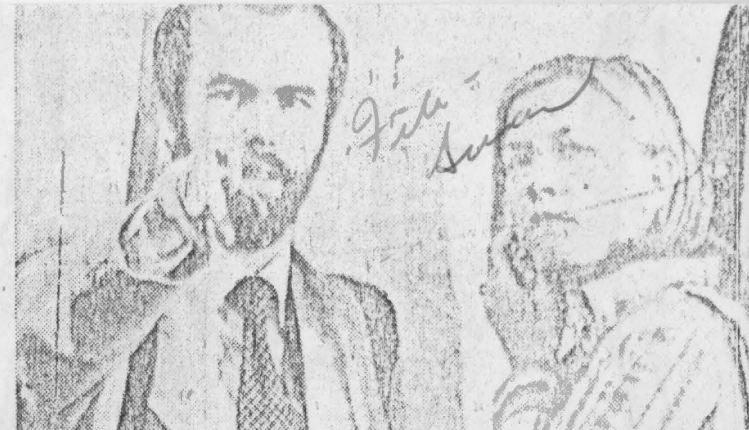

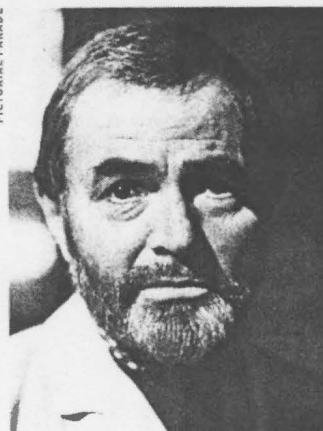

The President's 18-year-old daughter recently took a part-time job as a photographer for the associated Press. she works about 20 hours a week, according to AP sources, at times of her own choosing that fit in with her college schedule.

"It was a very hot discussion," a member said, "No matter how you look at it, she is not a

professional but still a student. It was no reflection on Susan personally."

According to AP photographer Charles Harrity, one of Susan's sponsors, the matter was tabled because the restaurant in which the meeting was held wanted the group out by 10 p.m. But other sources said the issue was whether she was being sponsored

because of her name ~~and not~~ because of her professional qualifications.
