Dear

Thank you for your letter in which you expressed your concern for the welfare of animals whose fur is used in making coats. You will be pleased to know that yours was only one of many I received from other citizens who are equally concerned.

Let me assure you that I share your desire to guarantee humane treatment for all animals; and I, therefore, was careful to check with the furrier before selecting the particular fur coat that I did.

As it was explained to me, muskrats are found throughout most of the United States and reproduce at a very rapid rate. In fact, their numbers multiply so fast that their dens often become overcrowded making it necessary to "push out" many members who are then left to face a slow death by starvation.

Trapping, of course, helps prevent these muskrats from having to starve to death, but then I questioned whether the method of trapping was any more humane than starvation. I was assured that the only traps used were the new Conibear traps that cause instantaneous death and do not allow the animal to linger in pain and fear as do the steel jaw traps.

Also, the trim for my coat came from a fox farm which, according to the Humane Society of the United States, has demonstrated that it "can raise and kill animals in captivity without causing suffering or fear."

Thank you for giving me the chance to explain my actions. I think it's just great that there are people such as you who are willing to volunteer their time, energy and hearts to protect our animals and help their local humane societies.

Dear Mas. Gary,-

Thank you for your letter in which you solicited my kelp in the very necessary campaign against cruelty to animals. I can well appreciate your reason for writing and want to assure you I do sympathize with your concern.

While I do wear furs and have asked for a fur coat for my graduation present, let me point out that I purchase them only from furriers who do not use pelts from trapped animals. You have most likely noticed that such a practice is encouraged by the Humane Society of the United States as is stated in one of the brochures you sent me.

You might be interested to know that many others have written to me just as you have, and I have urged all of them to also contact their Congressman, Senators and local law exforcement officials. I do this because I think it is important that we bring the unfortunate plight of so many of our animals to these officials' attention, as they are the ones who can make our laws dar stricter and better enforce them. I know it's not much, but I hope that my efforts to direct people to the proper authorities mill help in some small may to obliterate these eruel injustices.
