I. PURPOSE

A personal discussion with the Ambassador. He last met with you on January 27 after ending his term as the US Ambassador to India.

II. BACKGROUND, PARTICIPANTS & PRESS

A. <u>Background</u>: Ambassador Moynihan has returned to his teaching at Harvard after serving as the US Ambassador to India since March 1973. He served in New Delhi during a portion of the difficult period following the 1971 Indo/Pak war when our relations with India reached a low ebb. He may offer his impressions of the reaction to your decision to lift the arms embargo, announced February 24 and of its longer-term impact.

Ambassador Moynihan has had wide experience in Government, in addition to his excellence in the academic world. In recent years, he has variously served as Assistant to the President for Urban Affairs and a member and Executive Secretary of the Council on Urabn Affairs (1969), Counsellor to the President and member of the Cabinet (1969-71), member of the Domestic Council from its creation in 1970 (-1971) and Consultant to the President from 1971--when he returned to Harvard--through his appointment as Ambassador to India in 1973.
