Reply to Cablegram from Archbishop Makarios

On February 27, Archbishop Makarios sent the President a cablegram (at Tab B, together with the Department of State's memorandum) drawing attention to the non-implementation of certain portions of previous U. N. resolutions concerning Cyprus, explaining the reasons behind his government's recourse to the Security Council and asking for the support of the United States in the current U. N. debate.

Embassy Nicosia has recently expressed concern over the increasingly anti-American tone of the Gypriot press, particularly since the suspension of the intercommunal talks and the Turkish Cypriot action in mid-February to proclaim a quasi-independent state in the Turkish-occupied northern portion of Cyprus. A letter from the President to Archbishop Makarios would not go unnoticed in Nicosia and would provide an opportunity to underscore and clarify our Cyprus policy to the Cypriot leadership and people.

If you agree, the memorandum at Tab I for your signature to the President would forward a reply to Archbishop Makarios outlining our Cyprus policy, reaffirming our support for negotiations between the involved parties and expressing our willingness to continue to play an active role in facilitating an early negotiated solution to the Cyprus problem.

The President's letter has been cleared with Paul Theis.

Text of Message

February 27, 1975

Your Excellency:

During the past few days the Security Council has been discussing our recourse and a resolution is about to be adopted. I do not intend to refer in detail to the circumstances prevailing in Cyprus since the Turkish aggression on military occupation of a substantial part of the territory of the Republic. I would only like to invite attention to the fact that no development has taken place towards the implementation of these solutions of the General Assembly and the Security Council and particularly of Resolution No. 3212. Thus 40-0/0 of the Greek Cypriots continue to be displaced from their homes being compelled to live in appalling conditions and the Turkish troops are still occupying and devastating the north part of the island. Moreover, the recent unilateral proclamation of a federated Turkish Cypriot state has undermined and rendered meaningless the continuation of the intercommunal talks and has seriously aggravated the situation in Cyprus. My government has consequently had recourse to the Security Council asking for the full implementation of the United Nations resolutions which provide inter alia for speedy return of displaced persons to their homes in conditions of safety and the withdrawal of all foreign troops from Cyprus. I know Your Excellency's dedication to the principles of the United Nations Charter. I am confident that you will give the necessary instructions to your representative at the Security Council to support my government's effort for the adoption of effective measures for the implementation of the United Nations resolutions on Cyprus for the sake of a just and peaceful solution of the Cyprus problem safeguarding the independence, sovereignty and territorial integrity of Cyprus. Please accept Excellency, together with my appreciation, the assurances of my highest consideration and esteem.

Subject: Reply to Telegram from Archbishop Makarios

Archbishop Makarios cabled the President on February 27 drawing attention to the non-implementation of previous UN resolutions on Cyprus, explaining his Government's recourse to the Security Council, and asking United States' support.

A letter from the President would be front-page news in the Cypriot press. A friendly letter could helpfully serve to clarify our Cyprus policy and intentions, which are widely misunderstood on the island.

We have, therefore, drafted a sympathetic letter expressing disappoingment that more rapid progress toward a settlement has not been made and reaffirming our support for the negotiations and our willingness to continue to play an active role.

Mr. Eagleburger asks that this letter not be sent without clearance with the Secretary. However, he agrees to seeking NSC clearance first.
