FROM CAMBODIAN REFUGEE TO U.S. DIPLOMAT AND AUTHOR, SICHAN SIV SPEAKS UPON THE 35TH ANNIVERSARY OF THE FALL OF CAMBODIA AND VIETNAM

When Vietnam and Cambodia fell 35 years ago this spring, speaker Sichan Siv endured the Khmer Rouge slave labor camps, escaped, resettled in the U.S. as a refugee, and eventually became a senior U.S. diplomat to the United Nations with the rank of ambassador. His 2008 memoir *Golden Bones* is "gripping...always compelling."

From 1989 to 1993, Ambassador Siv served as Deputy Assistant to the President at the White House, and as Deputy Assistant Secretary at the State Department.
